### SECOND SALES DAY

LESS THAN 200,000 POUNDS NOW ON HAND.

Growers Are Confident That Prices Tomorrow Will Show Some Advance Over the First Sales—List of Holders With Amounts to Their Credit—Six Hundred Sacks Sold and Awaiting Shipment—Most of the Wool Outside Is Bargained for.

Tomorrow the second and the last of the wool sales to be held in Pendleton will occur. There are now about 170,000 pounds of wool in the Furnish warehouse, which will be for sale when the buyers gather tomorrow morning, and a little more is yet to be hauled in before the day is over.

This sale will practically clean up all of the wool in the county, leaving the calendar clean. The growers are confident that the prices will range a little higher tomorrow than they did at the last meeting here, but the buyers, of course, are of the opposite opinion. It is certain, however, that they will be as good for the grade of wool at the warehouses.

Smith and Campbell have 46 sacks, or 12,286 pounds for sale. Gullford Brothers, 200 sacks, or 70,000 pounds; George H. McDonald, 37 sacks, 10,343 pounds; A. H. Sunderman, 36 sacks, 14,319 pounds; U. G. Horn, 30 sacks, \$203 pounds; N. C. Nelson, 34 sacks, 11,877 pounds; Isaac Knotts, 61 sacks, 16,998 pounds; Charles Ely, 27 sacks, \$531 pounds, and D. W. Chapman, 55 sacks, or 17,047 pounds.

The warehouse of the Pacific Elevator Company, opposite the depot, is also full of wool, perhaps 600 sacks being stored there awaiting shipment to the east. This wool has been bought by various parties and is being held for a convenient time to ship. It has been stored in the Pacific warehouse in order to make room at the other place, which is so crowded with the wool now up for sale that it is with difficulty that the warehousemen are able to handle the contents at the time of the sales.

There is yet a little wool over the county which has not been brought to the warehouses, but this is mostly bargained for and will be hauled to town when the buyer is ready to ship to his house.

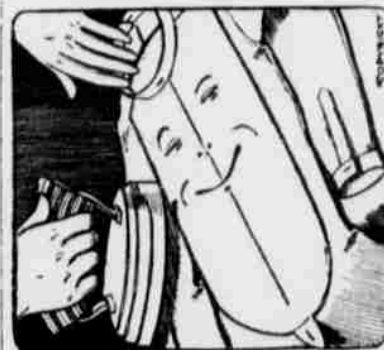
