### FLAT FLOUR MARKET

ORIENTAL TRADE IS PARTICULARLY DULL

Local Mill Sent Five Thousand Barreis to Tacoma Which is Stored There for Demand - Immense Flour Stock Stored Here and no Room for Incoming Wheat-Mills Will Be Shut Down During Low Water.

There is more flour stored away in the Byers warehouse at this time than for many months. All the buildings near the mill have been filled, and the present output of the mill is being put in the stone ware-house next to the woolen mills. It estimated there are now 20,000 barrels and more of flour stored and no immediate prospect of being able

The Oriental trade is at a stand still, and no flour is being shipped there. Pive thousand barrels that were bought by the American Trad-ing Company for January delivery have been shipped to Tacoma in the last week, where it will be stored for future shipment to the Orient. Owing to the war all shipping has ceased practically from here to the Far East and all orders from eastern shippers bave been left in the warehouses; but the buildings became so crowded bere that some room had to be made, and the American Company was ask ed to get their flour out of the way It is stated by representatives of the company that nothing can be sent out before the first of August or Septembefore which time all back or ders will have to be kept in storage

The Byers mill is up against the room question badly and will have to shut down in a short time if the market does not open so that some of the flour now on hand can be disposed of. Not only is there no room now for more flour, but there is no room in which to place any of the new wheat that must be bought in a short time. The mill now is being run at a loss, and so much money is being up in outputs that it has been practically decided to shut down as soon as the water begins to fall in the river, perhaps about the first of July. This will give the management an opportunity to work off a little of

the stock now on hand. During the low water it is very difficult to run the mill full time, and it will be just as well to close entirely until the market begins to open again, though such action is against the policy of the owner of the plant if any way out of the dilemma can
