

## NO. FIVE EARLIER

THE CHANGE WILL BE OF BENEFIT TO PENDLETON.

Travelers From This Point Can Put in an Entire Day in Portland and Return the Next Night — New Schedule Will Go into Effect Next Monday—Change Has Been Long Desired and is Most Acceptable.

The long desired change in the time of No. 5, the night train to Portland, has at last been decided upon, and the new schedule will go into effect Sunday next, the first train on the new time passing through Pendleton on Monday evening.

According to the new plan the train will be about one hour and 15 minutes earlier than at present, which will take it through Pendleton at practically 11:10 p. m. and put it into Portland at 7:45 a. m.

This change will be of great benefit to the people of this place, as a business man will be enabled to leave here in the evening, have a full day in Portland for the transaction of business, and return home early the next morning, thus losing but one day, where he had before to spend two on the trip.

No official announcement has been made to the local office as yet of the change, but it is out in Portland and is assured. The change has been in the wind for some time, but delay in making the connections in the running schedule has held it back until now.
