### New Flouring Mill.

The work on the flour mill at Peck, Idaho, continues, but it is now expected that the plant will not be started until late in June. It was first thought that the mill would be started June 15, but the work has been delayed. The mill company are now purchasing large quantities of high grade wheat and expect to manufacture a choice grade of flour. The mill will be fully equipped with the latest and best machinery and the company will endeavor to supply a large outside demand for their product.

### Telephone War at Kendrick.

For several days a representative of the Inland company, which is a Moscow organization, has been here soliciting farmers and business men to take stock in their enterprise and had succeeded in placing enough stock to make the proposition a go. the business men's association and offered their plan for consideration which resulted in the appointment of a committee to meet the farmers and business men who will meet Friday and report.

### The Dailies Will Help Decorate.

The Dailies people will be given an opportunity of assisting in the decoration of the graves of the Heppner flood victims next Tuesday by contributing flowers, says the Chronicle. Through the kindness of the O. R. & N. Co., Mrs. Britten, who did such effective work at Heppner after the flood, has been granted transportation, and will leave on the afternoon of the 13th for that place. She asks all who have flowers to contribute to send them to the home of G. A. Liebe as early as possible Monday morning that they may be packed so as to carry more easily.

### Forest Reserve Boundaries.

Forest Ranger Terrell, of the Baker City reserve, has about completed the work of establishing reserve boundary lines, by blazing trees and posting warnings to all sheep and stockmen to keep off the grass. The department of the interior has allowed Ranger Terrell considerable leeway in the matter of permitting stock to graze on the reserve. Sheep are expressly prohibited, but a reasonable number of cattle may be allowed to graze under Ranger Terrell's personal supervision.—Sumpter Daily Miner.

### Reclamation in Silvies Valley.

H. N. Savage of Los Angeles, Geo. W. Wisner of Detroit, J. T. Whistler, who has charge of the government reclamation work in Oregon, and M. D. Williams, one of the engineers of the geological survey, composed a party which visited this section this week for the purpose of looking over the Silvies valley reservoir site and securing information as to the feasibility of the proposed irrigation scheme.—Burns Times-Herald.

### SPOKANE FRUIT PRICES.

Last Shipment of Old Apples From Palouse Brings \$2 Per Box.

Spokane, June 10.—The commission men say this will be an ideal season for canning strawberries and that about June 25 local berries will be plentiful and cheap. The season was late this year and frosts did not harm the berries, so the gardeners are expecting a bumper crop. The Green Bluff Association of growers, about 15 miles northeast of the city, put up 15,000 crates of berries on the market last year and this year estimates its output between 20,000 and 25,000 crates.

A shipment of Newtown pippin apples came from the Palouse country yesterday. It is probably the last of the old apples, and the market will go bare until new apples come in. The apples were jobbed at \$2 a box. Snake river cherries are cheaper. The wholesalers quote them from 75 cents to \$1 per 10 pound box. Strawberries are being jobbed from \$1.75 to \$2.25 a crate of 24 quarts.

### BERRY HARVEST ENDS.

Rains Lessened the Crop at Lewiston and Vineland.

Fruitgrowers and shippers say the strawberry crop has nearly all been marketed, says the Lewiston Tribune. Rains throughout the season lessened the crop greatly, besides rendering the berries less valuable. Practically all of the Hood River variety have been shipped. Fair sized shipments of the latter varieties will be made during the coming week. In cherries, the Vineland and Lewiston crop, which is only about half as large as last year, is of fine quality. Many of the table varieties are now in market here, including the Royal Ann, Black Republican, Black Tartarian and Governor Woods. So far the demand has all been supplied, but it is expected that by the middle of next week orders will be received for larger quantities than can be produced.
