ENORMOUS POPULATION IS LEAPING UPWARD.

United States Has Third Largest Number of People Among the Nations-Russia and China Alone Exceed Our Record-Americans Live Higher and Think More Than Any Other People-The Unit of Population is What Counts.

The census bureau at Washington estimates the population of the United States at 80,000,000.

Looked at from one point of view, figures do not appear large. Eighty million is about 5 per cent of the pop-ulation of the globe. Compared with the population of other countries, however, the magnitude appears. The United States has a larger population than any other nation save two, Russia and China. China's people are estimated at 400,000,000. Russia has 130,000,000.

The Units of Population.

It is the unit of population that counts. Vast aggregations of people may mean nothing but figures. Compare the individual American, man to man, with the individual of any other country. Because of his higher capacity and by the use of the appliances which he has invented, the American can do as much in a day as dozen Chinamen or a half-dozen

The comparison of in-telligence is no less striking. The mass of illiterates in Europe has no complement in this country. Our average of intelligence is the highest the world has reached.

The United States is and has been in recent years the wealthiest coun-try in the world. We own 25 per cent of the wealth of the globe. We have six million farms worth over twentytwo billions of dollars. We have more than half a million factories employing a million and a half workers to whom is paid three billions of dollars in wages and whose product amounts to fourteen billions of dollars annually. We are first in the produc tion of livestock, farm products, silver, steel, copper, cotton and other things. Our per capita of wealth is \$1300. Our public debt, compared with the countries of Europe, is a bagatelle, being only 32 cents per

The United States is growing in every direction more rapidly than any other nation. We have been doubling our population about every 33 years. in 40 years the per capita of wealth has increased from \$525 to \$1300. The value of our farm and manufactured products has more than doubled in
