Railroad Ties from Shoe Leather.

The latest form of railway tie is made of leather. The scrap leather from shoe shops is taken into a disintegrator, ground very fine, subjected to a refining process and molded. The tension of the molding machine can be so regulated that ties hard enough to take a spike or ties through which a spike cannot be driven can be produced. The three great essentials in a cross tie are apparently found in this leather sleeper, for it is guaranteed to hold a spike, the fish plate will not splinter in it and it will not rot. Sample ties which have already been down 28 months fall to show the least wear.

New Powder Without Recoil.

Tests of a new powder which the inventor claims is without recoil are about to be made by United States government officials. If the inventor's claim can be proved true it will revolutionize ordnance and may perhaps revolutionize methods of warfare. The greatest difficulty that a maker of big guns has to overcome is the recoil, which in time puts the gun out of commission by destroying its machinery. The new powder, it is said, has no perceptible recoil, and a child may hold its hand on the breech of a big gun when fired without fear of being injured.

Potato Alcohol.

The use of potato alcohol to furnish light, heat and motive power has been developed rapidly and to a very high degree in Germany. Germany produces about 55,000,000 tons of potatoes a year and uses for human food, stock food and starch only about 25,000,000 tons. The remainder is converted into alcohol and used as a power generator for both land and water motors and for cooking, heating and lighting. The alcohol vapor is burned like gas, in chandeliers and street lamps, and gives a very bright light. In districts distant from mines it is cheaper than coal.

SHORTHAND BEFORE CHRIST.

Perfect System Said to Have Been in Vogue Among Romans.

"Stenography Before Christ," is the theme of an article in Cosmos, Paris. "Among the Greeks and Romans its existence is certain. The shorthand that they used was a form of writing in which each word was represented by a special sign.

"The letters of the alphabet, with modifications, connected so as to admit of great rapidity of execution, formed the element of these characters. They date at least from the first century before Christ. In the second century A. D. we find the term 'semeograph' (stenographic character) in the Greek orator, Flavius Philostratus.

"Origen of Alexandria (185-254 A. D.) tells us that he noted his sermons down in shorthand, and Socrates, the ecclesiastical historian of the fourth century, says that part of the sermons of St. John Chrysostom was preserved by the same process.

"In the first century B. C. a discourse of Cato Uticensis, if we may credit Plutarch, was taken down by shorthand reporters. The development of shorthand was due especially to Marcus Tullius Tiro. Born in Latium in 103 B. C., Tiro, who was a slave, was brought up with Cicero, who was some years his junior. Freed, he became Cicero's secretary, and in this capacity aided him greatly. In the famous trial of Catiline (63 B. C.) the stenographic rapidity of Tiro was at its height."

The Finger Print.

The finger print method of personal identification seems to be coming to the front. It has long been used as an adjunct to the Bertillon system of measurement and now we are told that in England it is superseding that system, being regarded as both simpler and surer. The trouble with any measurement system is that the measurements of the same man taken by different persons or at different ages will differ slightly, and so the identification may fail. Finger prints, on the other hand, tell their own story and are subject to no "personal equation"; while their system of ridges and whorls remain the same from infancy to manhood. In a recent European case reported in a French paper a murderer was detected through the agency of a thumb print on the rail of a broken sash—so slight a mark that it was scarcely visible—but photography enabled it to be studied sufficiently for identification.—June Success.
