TARGET PRACTICE

TROOPERS IN CAMP NEAR BINGHAM SPRINGS.

Companies F and H Now Encamped on the Umatilla for Summer Practice—Methods of Practice—A Sergeant Now on the Ground One of the 12 Best Shots in the United States Army.

About six weeks ago Major Erwin, commander of the government post at Walla Walla, accompanied by Captain Armstrong and Charles Wilkins, the latter agent of the Umatillas, held a conference with the Indians and secured a lease for three years of ground for a target range.

It is located two and a half miles north of Bingham Springs station, and is an ideal site for the purpose, as the winds blow up and down the canyon parallel with the range and hence no allowance need be made for deflection of the bullet from its course on account of the wind.

On May 15 a detachment of soldiers arrived from Walla Walla to clear the range of trees and brush and to construct the butts. On May 25 companies E and G arrived from Walla Walla and spent 10 days in target practice. Companies F and H, in command of Captain Slevert, are there. The range will be in use for two months each year. The supplies are shipped from Walla Walla, with the exception of the contract for meat, potatoes and hay, the meat and vegetables being supplied by nearby ranchers, while the hay is shipped in from Grande Ronde valley.

Companies F and H report some excellent scores being made. Target practice is begun at 6 a. m. and kept up with an intermission of an hour for dinner, until 7 p. m.

Each trooper's record is carefully kept. Small arms practice is part of the daily routine also. The camp is beautifully located on the banks of

the Umatilla river. The gleaming camp fires, the white tents and the mellow laughter and songs of the colored troopers adds a charm to the beauty of the scene.

Details of the Drill.
Each trooper fires five shots at the 200 yard line and the same number at the 300, 400, 500 and 600 yard line. In addition to this they have, daily, a skirmish drill. Figures simulating soldiers in kneeling, stooping and lying position are placed in front of the butts. These figures are frames of iron covered with canvas.

The trooper begins firing at the 600 yard line and after firing three shots, runs to the 500 line, where he fires several more shots and continues to advance, firing at each 100 yard line till he has arrived at the 200 yard line, where he fires five shots.

In all he fires 20 shots and his record is kept. The 20 shots must be fired in a certain time or they are not counted on his record.

One of the men, a sergeant, is a distinguished marksman, having participated in the seagirth contests and being one of the 12 best marksmen in the United States army.—Fred Lockley.
