Washington Fruit Crop Light.

"There are orchards burdened with peaches, pears, prunes, apricots and other tender fruits up Mill creek, Frank B. Morse, who has been spending much time lately on his duries as fruit inspector for the county which have not been at all touched by the frosts, and which will give a bountiful yield. But there seems to be a belt across the county in the neighborhood of Touchet, where even apples will give a very poor yield, while nearly all the tenderer trees will yield nothing.

"May 3 the thermometer went up to about 84; that night it sank to 28. The sudden change to such extremes caught the fruit. Where the limbs bent over, for a distance of about hree feet from the ground, there will be fruit that has been blackened by the frost. Above that there may be a little good fruit. 
