NEW WATER SUPPLY

COMMISSIONERS LOOKING TOWARD THE WILD HORSE.

Government Services to Secure a Thorough Investigation of the Subject Have Been Enlisted-Growth of the City and Increasing Density of Farming Population Makes Some Radical Departure Necessary.

The members of the water commis sion have long been looking for a more satisfactory source of water supply for the city than at present used. and have been investigating various ways and means to bring the bes that can be had into the city.

A short distance from town on Wild Horse, there is a place where numerous springs break from the ground, and it is supposed that there is a strong underflow of water along the bedrock at that point. Acting on this theory F. B. Clopton has written to the department of he interior ask-ing that a member of the bureau of the geological survey be sent to Pen-dieton for the purpose of making tests for the benefit of the city. In answer Mr. Clopton has received

letter from the department stating that the matter has been considered by them and it is thought to be feasible, and that, if it were possible, in the near future an hydrologist would be sent here to make investigations and find if there is at any place an underground flow sufficient to supply the city water service. "The import ance of the question is realized by the department and will be given due at

Mr. Clopton has now written to J Williamson, urging that gentleman to use his influence with the heads of the department in securing early ac-

PANAMA MONETARY PLAN

New Republic Will Imitate the Finan ces of the United States.

Washington, June 15 .- The Pana ma joint commission met in Secre-tary Tait's office today and spent two hours in discussing the currency question.

It was evident from the views ex pressed by the Panama representa tives that they were inclined to adhere strictly to the currency system used in the United States.

The Panama commissioners pre-

sented their views at length, and produced a copy of the bill pending be fore their legislature providing for the establishment of a gold standard in Panama on the same basis as in the in the Philippines).

Secretary Taft insisted that ade quate provision be made for a suffcient reserve fund to maintain the silver on a gold basis if the silver coin was to be used in the canal zone

The Panama representatives stated that their government had already given study to this question, and had provided so a deposit of \$6,000,000 for the benefit of posterity, allowing the remaining \$4,000,000 of the \$10,000. 000 received from the United States, to be employed in public work.

They expressed the belief that their government would adopt a plan sat-isfactory to the United States, but they wanted time to redraft the pending bill and consult with their princl-
