TOO COLD FOR CROPS NIGHTS OF PAST WEEK

EXCEPTIONALLY COOL.

Late Grain Making Slow Growth-Haying Now in Full Blast-Frost Does Damage to Tender Vegetables in Many Localities-Fruit Crops Are Uneven.

Following is the government crop report for the past week:

The week has been dry and too car for rapid growth, Except in the coast counties and a few localities in the Willamette valley, rain is budly need ed for late crops. Fall wheat and barley are heading nicely and promise good yields.

Early sown wheat, harley and oats are also doing fairly well, but late grain of all kinds is making slow growth, and without timely rains will give unusually light returns.
