GENERAL NEWS.

An insurrection has broken out in the province of San Luis, Brazil, and the governor has been imprisoned.

With the avowed purpose of reducing expenses, the Erie railroad has during the past four months discharged 4500 men, but now calls a halt.

A St. Louis paper describes Bristow (fourth assistant postmaster-general) as having 30,000 employees under him, and 200 congressmen on top of him.

Samuel Faulkner, of Butte county, California, went over a grade with an ore crusher weighing 12,000 pounds. Together they fell 400 feet with Faulkner squarely beneath the crusher.

The cruiser Tacoma has left San Francisco in search of the steamer Conemaugh, missing since January last and supposed to be lost off Cape Horn with 46 men and a cargo of sugar.

All American and European suicide statistics show that the rate is highest in cities which contain the largest proportion of German population or allied nationalities, such as Bohemian and Russians, etc.

Desire Breigiere, a guard on a Brooklyn elevated railroad, has fallen heir to a French estate of \$350,000. He was a runaway boy to New York, and first made his living there selling papers on the street.

July 9, 1904, will be the 100th anniversary of the death of Alexander Hamilton, killed in a duel by Aaron Burr. Admirers of Hamilton are having a beautiful monument erected at his burial place, which will be uncovered July 9.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Baptist Foreign Missionary Society of Oregon is in session at Portland.

An independent telephone company is making a fight for a franchise in Eugene.

Two attempts at Baker City to raise funds for a Fourth of July celebration have failed.

The Columbia River Conference of the United Brethren is in annual session at Elberton, Wash.

A Roseland miner named Frank Lyons, was killed by a premature blast in the War Eagle mine.

President Joseph F. Smith, head of the Mormon church, will visit Portland before returning to Utah from La Grande.

The accidental or criminal poisoning of the chief of the Cowichan Indians of British Columbia, is creating great local excitement.

William Phillips died at Lewiston June 14. He had lived in Idaho since 1865 and taken part in every Indian war in the Northwest since.

The first vessel of the second fleet to sail for Nome this season, was the Valencia, which carried 200 passengers and left Seattle June 15.

Two little girls living near Eugene quarreled June 14 and one pushed the other (named Pearl Wheeler and aged 7 years) into a millrace, where she was drowned.

Roy Taylor, a Seattle waiter, has fallen heir to the income from an estate of \$1,000,000, left him by his father in England. Taylor ran away from home when a small boy.

Andres Anderson was found unconscious June 14 in Astoria, and has since died. It is suspected that death was caused by his being thrown down stairs from a dance, and an investigation is in progress.

COMBINES GOING

PROPHESIED THAT
THEIR STAR WANES.

Nevertheless, One Hundred Twenty-Five Will Be Used in This County This Year—Line of Argument Advanced Against Them—Said to Be Entirely Tabooed on the Reservation—Many Believe That Old-Style Threshers Will Supersede All Worn-out Combines.

Now that the sun is warm and the wheat is beginning to spring from the ground, the farmers are beginning to think of the harvest, and of the means of garnering it.

Last year there were close to 100 combined harvesters at work in the county, and this year the number will be increased by approximately 25 per cent. From the present outlook it is estimated that 15 more Holt machines, six Bests and five Haines & Houser machines will be put into Umatilla county fields when the wheat is ready to cut.

Charles Hamilton, L. L. Mumm, H. H. Williams, Jesse Boyce, Joergen Mumm, Norton and Terney, Guy McCarty, William Connerly, Henry Molstrom, Sylvester Hartle and a long list of other wheat raisers of this county, have bargained for new machines and will have them ready by the time the wheat is ripe.

Aside from the combined harvesters there will be some big steamer stationary and one or two horsepower machines put into the fields that have just come from the manufacturers. There seems to be a revival of sentiment in favor of the stationary machines, and it is predicted that the life of the combined harvester is limited in this county, to some extent at least.

Straw and feed for the cattle and horses are questions that have been worrying the farmer and the stockman for several years, and the combined machine has not done anything to settle the question. It is claimed by the combine men that the straw can be dumped in large enough bundles to enable it to be used for feed by the cattle men; but this has not been proven to the satisfaction of those who have to depend on it to supply their stock with feed.

It is said that the combined machine is a thing tabooed on the reservation, and that the government will in the future refuse to lease Indian land to any farmer who will not promise to use a stationary machine in threshing. The Indians have to have feed for their horses and cattle, and have no way to get it without too much expense if the straw is scattered all over the township. What is true there is also true generally, and the farmers are hunting for some way to save the straw.

Another argument against the combine, is that it fouls the ground. It is said that in California the new machine is rapidly passing for this reason. It scatters the seed of various unwanted weeds over the land as it passes, and sows the fields with them. Another thing is that the horses have to be driven into the grain on the hillside in order to hold the machine where it will be able to reach the standing wheat.

In the first place, the new machine came into use because of the scarcity of help, and now it is being used to decrease expense, for it is cheaper to run a combined machine than to operate a stationary machine. But the loss of the straw cuts out all gain from the saving, for all of the money saved from the operating expenses has to be paid out for feed during the winter by those who have horses and cattle.

But, in spite of the arguments against them, there will be in the neighborhood of 125 machines in the county during the summer to come, 25 of which will be new. When their life is passed it is claimed that the old machines will come back into more general use, the farmer will have straw, and the army of harvest hands thrown out of work by the combines will once more be a necessity.
