1904 WHEAT CROP

ENGLAND WILL BUY MORE THAN EVER BEFORE.

Prospects in the United States Show That Conditions Are 15 Per Cent Worse Than Last Year—Australia's Crop Will Be Three Times Greater Than Last Year—India's Yield Also Much Greater.

The Statist, a publication of London, England, in its issue of April 30, 1904, reports the wheat crop outlook for 1904 in the various countries as follows:

United States—Winter wheat: Average condition 15 per cent worse than last year, on an acreage to be reaped probably 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 acres less than last year. Spring wheat sowing is rather in arrears, but there is plenty of time for a full if not an increased acreage.

Canada—In Manitoba wheat sowing is much later than last year, but preparations have been made for increasing the area to be sown.

Russia—An unfavorable seed time in the autumn has caused a much smaller area to be sown than last year, the weather conditions during the winter having been unfavorable, on the whole the present condition is generally poor, although the weather is now much more favorable. Spring sowings are in arrears and on the whole the prospect is for a much smaller crop in Russia than was reaped last year.

France—There has been a great improvement in the crop prospects here, but the area sown is smaller than last year. Last year's crop is proving to be larger than had been expected, little or no foreign wheat being wanted. The value of home-grown wheat in France is, in fact, 4s. to 5s. (97 cents to \$1.21) per quarter below an importing point.

Austria-Hungary—The prospects are quite favorable in these countries.

Roumania—Crop conditions are favorable on the whole, but not so promising as at this time last year.

Germany—The official report for April 15 made the condition of wheat eight points better than last year and also states that only four-tenths of 1 per cent of the area sown has had to be replowed, while last year about 14 per cent was winter killed.

Italy—The prospects are good, but not so favorable as at this period last year.

United Kingdom—The area sown is expected to be the smallest on record, viz.: About 1,400,000, against 1,620,000 acres last year. The probability, therefore, is that next season the United Kingdom will require more foreign wheat than in any previous season.

Australasia—Recent cables give the yield of the crop in New South Wales at 3,400,000 quarters, against 200,000 quarters last year; in Victoria, at 3,550,000 quarters, against 320,000 quarters; and in South Australia, at 1,650,000 quarters against 755,000 quarters last year. The total yield in South Australia is, therefore, 10,000,000 quarters, against 2,480,000 quarters last year, so that the surplus for export will be about 5,500,000 quarters, which is more than double the quantity exported in any previous year.

India—Our Indian empire has, it is now tolerably certain, a record crop this year, estimated at about 40,000,000 quarters, against 36,750,000 quarters last year, when the crop allowed of an export of about 6,000,000 quarters.

Argentina—Argentina has already exported since January 1, 40 per cent more wheat than in the corresponding period last year, and there is no longer any doubt that the last crop was a very large one.

GETTING READY FOR HARVEST.

Great Rush of Preparation by the Farmers.

The farmers are beginning to get ready for the big harvest with a vim. At each one of the lumber yards men are at work on header beds, straw racks, cook wagons and water tanks for the use of the threshing outfits. At one of the yards alone the men have finished a dozen header wagons and they are waiting to be put onto the wagons and hauled to the farms where they are to be used.

The farm hands are beginning to come into the country for the hay harvest and the advance work on the grain farms, and the town is filling up. All the rooming houses are full and the streets are full of men who are looking for work. With this crowd it is true there are a lot of men who would run from work as they would from the smallpox, but these are easily picked out by the police, and are being run out of town as fast as they come in.

KADIAK BEAR HIDES.

C. C. Berkeley Receives Two, Each as Large as a Horse Hide.

C. C. Berkeley received a couple of Kadiak bear hides this morning sent him by Al Despain, who has been in the north for the past three years. The Kadiak bear is the largest bear known, and the specimens sent Mr. Berkeley, while not so large as have been known, must have looked full grown when full of bear meat, being fully as large as an average horse hide. Of course, the bear's legs being shorter, the bear did not stand so high in the air, but would undoubtedly make a spot on the landscape if coming at the man without a tree.

The fur is very thick and heavy, and softer than that of the more southern bear. Mr. Berkeley will have them dressed and made into rugs.
