GOVERNOR ASSASSINATED.

Shot by Member of Finnish Patriotic Party.

Elsingford, June 17.—General Bobrikoff, governor general of Finland, was shot and fatally wounded at the entrance of the Finnish senate this morning by a son of Senator Schumann, who immediately suicided. Schumann was a member of the Finnish patriotic party. Bobrikoff was taken to St. Petersburg in a dying condition.

Bobrikoff Dead.

St. Petersburg, June 17.—General Bobrikoff died last night.

Finns Rejoice.

Stockholm, June 17.—The large colony of Finns here are openly jubilant over the fate of Bobrikoff. They say he was the most ruthless tyrant who ever stole a people's liberty.

Rebellion in Trinidad.

St. Petersburg, June 17.—A Helsingfors dispatch states that Finnish leaders who had fled, are now planning to return and take part in a revolutionary agitation.

For 47 Years Thomas M. Reed Has Been Secretary.

Seattle, Wash., June 17.—The Masonic grand lodge is the largest in point of attendance in the history of the order in this state, and it will be remembered further from the fact that it will mark the last appearance of Thomas Milburn Reed, the venerable grand secretary, from Olympia, in his official capacity.

Mr. Reed for 47 years has been secretary of the grand lodge in this territory.

NEW BAKER CITY ENTERPRISE.

Electric Light and Power From Rock Creek.

Baker City, June 17.—Baker City will soon be supplied with electric light and power from the Rock creek power plant, some 20 miles northwest of the city. The plant has been completed and the water wheels are in place. They will be operated a few days to get them in good working order before the dynamo is started.

This plant will supply about 1000 horsepower, which will be distributed in every direction to operate mine machinery, supply water power for various purposes in this city, light the streets, and operate irrigation pumps.

A large number of miles in the vicinity of Bourne will obtain power from this plant.
