LANDOWNERS WILL BUILD IN THE PROSSER BEET BELT.

FARMERS' RAILROAD

Local Capitalists of Franklin County Backed by the Northern Pacific, Have Organized the Sunnyside Railway Company With \$500,000 Capital-Beet Factory at Prosser Assured-New Road Designed to Haul Beets to the Factory-M. L. Causey, of La Grande, Promoting the Factory.

railroad, extending 35 miles from Toppinish to Prosser, through the richest section of the Prosser beet and wheat land, has been organized from with a capital stock of \$50 backed by the Northern Pacific. \$500,000.

The incorporators of the new company are Walter N. Granger, general manager of the Washington Irrigation Company, and George P. Eaton, of Zillah: Morris Sisk, of Liberty: S. J. Harrison, C. E. Woods and Norman Woodin, of Sunnyside; H. F. Gloyd and F. L. Pitman, of Prosser, and A. B. Flint, of Outlook. The new or-ganization is called the Sunnyside Railway Company and is formed as a result of the sugar beet agitation that district.

The beet sugar factory being pro-moted at Prosser by M. L. Causey, of La Grande, is now a certainty and this road is designed to carry the boets from the principal beet belt in the Sunnyside district to the factory. The road will be built by the farm-

ers of the district, each man taking stock being required to subscribe amount equal to \$5 per acre on his land. The Northern Pacific Railroad The Washington & Columbia River Company has guaranteed to float bonds sufficient to furnish the track. bridges and equipment, which assures the early construction of the road. The Northern Pacific will also fur-

stock will be kept in repair by that One remarkable feature of the en-

terprise is that a large settlement of Dunkards headed by Rev. D. J. Harrison, is taking an active interest in promoting the culture of sugar beets and is also foremost in pushing the new railroad. The colony of Dunkards near Sunnyside is one of the largest in the West and they are highly industrious, progressive and enterprising people.

The land in the Sunnyside district is rich, sandy soil, resembling the Echo soil and is especially adapted to sugar beet culture and the assurance of the factory at Prosser will increase land values 25 per cent.

M. L. Causey, of La Grande, who is promoting the Prosser factory, is the man who brought the sugar factory to La Grande and to his energy and patience is due the increase in farm-



Schuman, who immediately suicided Schuman was a member of the Fin-nish patriotic party. General Bobrikoff was taken to St. Petersburg in dying condition.

Gen. Bobrikoff is responsible for the cruel oppression of the whole Finnish people ever since he has been governor general of the country. It was through his efforts that Finland was robbed of her army. Bobrikoff for a number of years had been gradually increasing the rigor of the mili-tary requirements of the Finns, and his last coup was to take from that people their individual military pow-

The Finnish soldiery, since the imperial ukase went forth to disband the army, has been drafted into the Rusian army and the command of all troops in the land has been given to tussian officers.

The increase of taxation, the sub-stitution of the Russian tongue as the court language, the substitution of Russian courses of study in all the schools, and other severe forms of Russian intolerance and discipline were laid at Bobrikoff's feet by the Finns.

A number of unsuccessful attempts have been made on his life previous to this last and successful attempt.

#### REGISTER MORE VOTERS.

Direct Primary Law Requires Books Be Opened for November Election.

By a provision in the direct pri-mary law enacted last week at the polls, registration of voters will be re-sumed this autumn for the November elections.

Heretofore the registration law has been deficient in that respect, for it has required electors to register prior to May 15 in order to vote in November for president, or to vote on the affidavit of six freeholders.

amdavit of six freeholders. County clerks throughout the state are now required to reopen the regis-tration books "between September 20, 1904, and 5 o'clock p. m. of October 20, 1904, and between the same dates in each and every year thereafter in which there shall be an election of presidential electors." In November the first elections for

In November the first elections for prohibition will be held under the lo-cal option law on the same day as the election for president, namely, November 8.
