### GENERAL NEWS.

Tiger hunting in India during 1903 "broke even," the hunters bagging 359 tigers and the tigers bagging 190 men.

Charles Netcher, proprietor of the Boston Store, in Chicago, died from the effects of an operation for appendicitis.

By the burning of a saloon and lodging house in Cleveland, two persons were burned to death and several severely hurt.

By invitation, a United States army band led the procession of ex-Confederate soldiers in the recent reunion at Nashville.

In the recent suburban handicap at New York, Irish Lad, Hermis and Picket were entered. Hermis won. Nearly \$300,000 was up in private bets representing every possible combination.

Of the victims of the Slocum disaster, the lives of nearly 90 per cent were insured in three companies, making a specialty of insuring working people and those in moderate circumstances.

The Oregon delegation to the Chicago convention has chosen W. B. Ayer chairman, C. H. Carey member of the national committee and J. W. Campbell member of the committee on resolutions.

J. H. Childs has a contract for digging 10,000 feet of excavation for new water mains in La Grande.

Dan Yen, a Chinese vegetable vendor, was shot in the back at Olympia Monday, by an unknown assailant.

During 24 hours, Saturday and Sunday night, 20 robberies and hold-ups were reported to the Spokane police.

A game of ball between Cathlamet and Hanter, played at Cathlamet Sunday, ended in a general fight over a decision of the umpire.

Seattle banks are making a bitter fight over the office of county treasurer, two rival banking companies each having a candidate.

The subject of advancing the rates of assessment in the A. O. U. W. will be fought out in the Oregon grand lodge which meets in Portland in July.

The saloons at Independence have been ordered closed on Sunday. For the first time in the history of the city the side doors of all saloons were closed.

In a monster mass meeting attended by 10,000 people, Butte miners protested to the president against the treatment of Colorado miners by the militia, Monday.

One thousand crates of strawberries on the farm of J. W. Moore, at Hood River, have been offered to anyone free of charge if they would pick and haul them away. Slack market is the cause.

## WORK ON STREETS

COMMISSIONER BROWN DOING EFFECTIVE SERVICE.

Property Owners Are Urged to Repair Sidewalks and Crosswalks and Keep Them in Repair—Work of Cleaning Up Debris From the Streets is Well in Hand.

Considerable effective and much needed repairing has been done on the streets of late, particularly in the way of putting in new crossings. Crossings have been put in at the following places: Two at the intersection of Webb and Alta, one at Cosbie and Alta, one at Aura and Alta, one at Willow and Alta, one at Calvin and Alta, one at Main and Water, and two at Main and Court. Very soon two will be put in at Thompson and Alta, and two at College and Alta. The average cost of these crossings, including labor and material, is \$8.25 at points not on Main street; on Main street the average cost is somewhat more.

Commissioner Brown urges all property owners to get a hustle on them and see that the walks and crossings adjacent to their property are properly and effectively repaired and afterward kept in repair. The work must be done this summer, too; if not by the property owners it will be done by the city, which will cost more, inevitably, and in either event the property owner adjacent must pay the bill. Moral—Do it yourself and save money.

Mr. Brown has the work of clearing away debris left from the sewer construction well in hand, and it will be completed in a very short time. He is also looking after getting the streets cleared everywhere of litter, and is filling holes and reducing the unsightly and annoying hillocks here and there to be found.

### SALEM HIGHLY HONORED.

Many Men From Capital City Elected to Positions of Trust.

The state conventions of various of the fraternal and secret orders of Oregon have taken place recently, and a number of people known locally to the readers of this paper have received honors thereat, says the Salem Statesman.

Mr. D. Webster of this city was elected a member of the council of administration of the Grand Army of the Republic, while Prof. Z. M. Parvin was named as one of the delegates from Oregon to the national encampment, which will take place at Boston, Mass., in August. Miss Lizzie Smith and Miss Helen Southwick of this city were elected members of the executive board of the Woman's Relief Corps at the encampment at Hood River.

At the Masonic grand lodge which met in Portland, Dr. W. T. Williamson, a former Salem resident, was elected senior grand warden, and Lot L. Pearce of Salem, junior grand warden. Lot L. Pearce was also elected grand king. L. Steiwer of Salem, grand captain of the host; Judge Geo. H. Burnett of Salem, grand lecturer of the Royal Arch Masons.

At the grand lodge of the I. O. O. F. at Astoria recently, Salem fared remarkably well. Grand Master Mills being from Salem; Deputy Grand Master Hodson coming from Stayton, and while Grand Warden Carter is not a Salem man, his family relatives cause him to stand well with Salem people.

### Rush to the Bitter Roots.

A packer who accompanied Lefe Williams of this city to the latter's black lead property in the Bitter Root mountains, reached Orofino yesterday. He made the trip out by way of Missoula from which point he took the train to Orofino. The packer reports that the trip was a rough one as from four to 10 feet of snow was encountered in places. Mr. Williams and party left Orofino about three weeks ago and they were the first to enter the Black Lead district this year. The packer left Mr. Williams comfortably located at his property and he will spend the summer there in development work. The packer states that the snow is rapidly disappearing and that the Pierce trail into the district is a good one. He also reports that many people are planning to enter the district, and the interest already shown assures a big rush from the Montana side.—Lewiston Tribune.
