HUDSON BAY BRIEFS ALBA NEWS NOTES

BEEF STEERS WORTH FOUR CENTS IN WALLA WALLA.

Considerable Number of New Buildings Projected or Being Built—New Bridge Over Pine Creek—Three Thousand Tons of New Alfalfa—All Ready for Wheat Harvest—Some Effects of Irrigation.

Milton, June 20.—C. E. Simonds sold his steers a few days ago to Walla Walla butchers for 4c a pound. Dana Saunders, Clint Hodgen and C. E. Simonds of this section, are improving with new buildings; the two former with barns and the latter a dwelling.

John Shaver has the timber all on the ground for the bridge across Pine creek at the upper end of the bay, where it leaves the canyon.

Howard Wheelock of Boston, Mass., is visiting and helping Mr. C. E. Simonds do his haying this spring. This is Mr. Wheelock's first trip out from Boston, and he says the experience he is getting is worth the price. He, however, thinks the days a little long in this "wild and woolly West," but considers that quite an advantage, as it gives a man a good chance to do something. Mr. Wheelock will work in the wheat harvest a while before returning home.

Results of Irrigation. The Milton, Froewater & Hudson Bay irrigation ditch has, and is working wonders for a part of this country. Some of the land that did not raise anything but sagebrush and rats, is being cultivated and producing good crops, while other parts that were producing good crops are too wet and are almost valueless for anything except pasture. But so far as we are able to learn, no one is complaining about it, as it produces the very best pasture and will bring from \$8 to \$15 an acre and save a "deal of hard work."

Alfalfa, Wheat and Rye.

The first crop of alfalfa hay, which will amount to nearly 3000 tons, is about all up. The hay this year, owing to the cold, late spring, is not so long and brushy as usual, which makes it much better for the stock and farmer.

Wheat is ready to harvest, and ere this week ends the header will be cutting down the golden grain.

On the Boshau ranch, near the Vincent school house, are 220 acres of barley that will make an average of 45 bushels to the acre. Heretofore 20 to 30 has been a good crop; water did it.

RANGE WAR CONTINUES.

Shepherd Shot at While on Duty in Wheeler County.

The scene of the range war between cattle men and sheepmen has been transferred to Wheeler county. Last Sunday a band of sheep were attacked by three masked men on the summit between Spray and Lone Rock, about three miles west of the George Robinson place.

The sheep, however, were not injured, as the herder was the target of the outlaws who emerged from the woods heavily masked and when about 60 yards distant opened fire on the herder, who escaped without serious injury, although his clothing was pierced in two places by the leaden messengers. The outlaws then retreated to the woods where they had left their horses and made their escape.

The sheep belonged to Nat Wallace of Arlington, who was on his way to the Greenhorn mountains for summer range.—Spray Courier.

American Women Take Part.

London, June 21.—Queen Alexandra in Albert Hall this afternoon opened the great bazaar in aid of the Victoria Hospital for Children. The magnitude of the present undertaking, which lasts three days, quite eclipses any affair of the kind held since the great national bazaar in aid of the Boer war sufferers. The stalls are attended by titled personages and the elite of London's society. The Countess of Cadogan is the chief promoter of the affair. Other prominent participants are Mrs. Ronalds, Mrs. Arthur Paget, the Duchess of Roxburghe, Mrs. Cornwallis-West and Princess Henry of Pleiss.
