The Resourceful West.
The organization of the Standard Metal Polish Company in Spokane recently has aroused considerable interest in Lewiston. The company was incorporated for \$1,000,000 and J. B. Tuttle of Valley, I. A. Tuttle of Astoria, and J. T. Mulligan of Davenport, join in the organization. The Standard Metal Polish Company owns properties on the upper Snake river near Pittsburg Landing and it is expected the company will commence operations on a large scale during the summer. The company is formed for the purpose of handling a valuable deposit which is found on the upper Snake river in large strata and is especially valuable as the base for compounding of a valuable metal polish.

Dr. Alyea, postmaster at Eureka, recently reported a deposit of the same mineral on the properties of the Eureka Mining, Smelting & Power Company, and after making a careful chemical analysis of the substance pronounced it very valuable as the base for the compounding of polish and recommended that the Eureka company take the matter in hand. The deposit is of the character of chalk and is found in large beds in the Eureka district.—Lewiston Tribune.

Indian Maidens Run Away.

The first of the week two young Indian girls escaped from the Indian school at Chemawa, and attempted to return across the Cascades to their home on the Warm Springs reservation. After reaching Table Rock, in this county, they found the snow so deep that they were compelled to change their course and tried to reach their home by the Sandy route. They stopped at the home of W. Gregory at Molalla, and were taken to the Molalla hotel, when their whereabouts were telephoned to the authorities at the school who came and took them back to Chemawa.

Had they not been turned back by the snow it is probable that they would have made their way in safety back to the reservation, as they dis-

played all the woodcraft attributed to the natives in making their attempt to cross the mountains.

When asked by their captors at Molalla why they wished to leave the school, they stated that they were whipped for the most trivial offenses, and were badly treated in other ways. Whether there is any truth in these statements was doubted by the Molalla residents, who are slow to credit the Indian character with any great amount of straightforwardness. It is supposed they tired of the regulations maintained at the training school and pined for the free life of the reservation.—Salem Statesman.

Would Close Bourne Saloons.

Ben Ross, of Bourne, is in the city today from the richest mining camp in the West. Bourne, it will be known, is the exact center of the Cracker Creek mother lode, where are situated such famous gold mines as the E. & E. Columbia and North Pole, three of the greatest properties in the Western states.

Mr. Ross, who is a prominent saloon man of Bourne, views with alarm the danger of an application of the recently enacted local option law to his town. Bourne boasts of about six saloons. Patrons are miners from the contiguous camps. The payroll which monthly goes over the bar at Bourne aggregates four or five thousand dollars.

A Big Scheme.

In conversation with the editor of the Herald, a prominent Sumpterite, who voted for local option at the recent election, expressed himself in effect as follows:

"I voted for local option with but one sole and single object in view—the closing of the saloons at Bourne. I am in a position to know that the recent strike at the E. & E. mine, which was amicably adjusted in due time, grew out of the booze question, and that the compulsory boarding house matter was not an issue."—Baker City Herald.

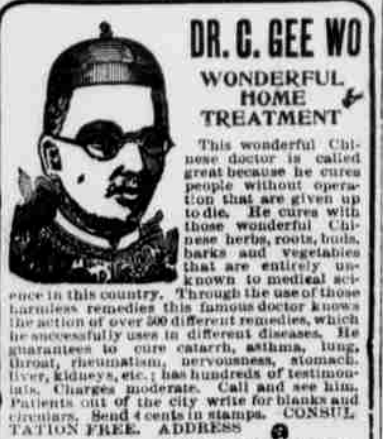

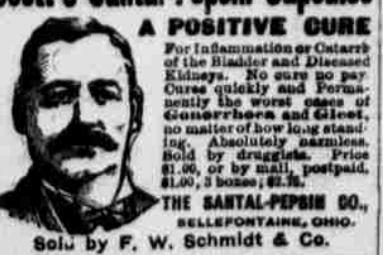
