GENERAL NEWS.

By an explosion on the yacht Cleo L., in New York harbor, Albert Ackie the owner, and Charles Johnson, were killed.

The populists will undoubtedly fuse with the democrats this year in the event of the Bryan wing winning at St. Louis. Otherwise they will keep in the middle of the road.

The four men who robbed the Northern Pacific at Bearmouth, Montana, of \$10,000, seem to have made a complete get-away. Traces are found of them, but nothing further.

Kent J. Loomis, brother of Assistant Secretary of State Loomis, deliberately jumped overboard from the liner Kaiser Wilhelm an hour before she reached the dock at Plymouth.

In the event of the populists repudiating the work of the democratic national convention, ex-Senator William V. Allen, of Nebraska, will probably be their candidate for president.

Lulu Adams, of La Junta, Col., has been acquitted by the jury which tried her for killing Patrick H. King last February. King had betrayed her under promise of marriage and then refused to marry her.

John Watts, a wealthy rancher of Conejo, Cal., and a hard drinker, has quit the habit for good without taking the Keeley cure, or signing the pledge. While drunk he lay down on the Santa Fe tracks and was cut in pieces by a passenger train.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Jacob C. Coplinger, of Salem, an Oregon pioneer, died Wednesday, aged 89.

Salem voted in favor of establishing a high school at the school election Monday.

The Polk county hop crop is short owing to the dry weather of the past three weeks.

Mrs. Nancy K. McNamer, of Forest Grove, an Oregon pioneer of 1852, died Wednesday, aged 68.

Elisha Kellogg, a pioneer steamboat engineer of 1848, died at Portland Wednesday, aged 78 years.

The official count of Klamath county shows that that county went against local option by 455 to 329 votes.

Engineer G. M. Hall, of the Canadian Pacific, became violently insane at his post on a freight engine, Wednesday, at Sloum, B. C.

The United States monitor Wyoming and the torpedo boat destroyers Paul Jones and Perry will be in Portland for two weeks after June 25.

The United States immigration bureau has sent a permanent inspector, George W. Lerner, to be stationed at Astoria in addition to the officials already there.

The Nebraskan, an elegant freight steamer, has arrived in Portland from New York by way of the Straits of Magellan, making the 13,622 miles in 56 days, using crude oil for fuel.

Frank Ganrascia, father of Freda Ganrascia, who was murdered by her Italian lover, Frank Guglielmo, at Portland, last week, has sued Guglielmo's estate for \$5000 damage for the death of his daughter.

Eanger Irving Couse, the well known artist and portrait painter of New York, will spend the summer of 1904 among the Yakima and Umatilla Indians, studying their characteristics for art purposes.

WALLOWA WOOL BALED AT ELGIN

CLIP WAS FORMERLY HANDLED AT PENDLETON.

Over 2,000,000 Pounds Will Be Baled and Shipped From There This Season—Observations by Fred Lockley in Wonderful Grande Ronde Valley—Beets, Fruit and Wheat Districts Now at Their Best.

Elgin, June 2.—J. C. Trampleasure has arrived from Pendleton to take charge of the wool press here. Heretofore the Wallowa wool has gone to Pendleton or The Dalles to be baled. Wool from Wallowa and Baker counties will be baled here this season. It is expected that between 2,000,000 and 2,500,000 pounds of wool will be baled at Elgin. Most of the Wallowa wool was sold while still on the sheep's backs.

New Wallowa Stage.

Elgin is the terminus of the railroad from La Grande and it has proved such a good stage point that a new stage company has been formed called the Tenderfoot Stage Company.

Yesterday the old stage company had 26 passengers for Joseph and way points, while the Tenderfoot Stage Company was loaded to its full capacity also. Passengers are allowed 50 pounds of baggage and one of the passengers a drummer, had seven trunks weighing 1500 pounds as excess baggage, charged for at the rate of 1 1/2 cents per pound. Traveling with seven trunks is rather expensive.

With the large amount of travel into Wallowa county, it seems strange that the railroad company does not push this branch line on to Joseph. It would wonderfully stimulate the upbuilding and the development of the country.

The valley, the Grand Ronde, is destined to be one of the garden spots of the Inland Empire.

Timber, fruit, small fruits, hay and stock are its principal productions now.

The fruit industry, for which it is peculiarly adapted, is capable of almost indefinite extension. Probably no better cherries, Blings, Lamberts and Royal Anns are grown in Oregon than are raised around Cove.

Like Umatilla county, Union and Wallowa county are just entering on a period of steady growth and development.
