## NO LABOR TROUBLE

### OREGON MINERS NOT AGAINST THE FEDERATION.

C. H. Gram, President of the Oregon Federation Denies Report That He is Urging Sumpter Miners to Quit Their General Organization — Says Great Labor Bodies Are Working Together.

C. H. Gram, president of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, and organizer for the American Federation of Labor, arrived on the train from Baker City yesterday morning, says Wednesday's Sumpter Miner. He left in the afternoon for a short visit to Bourne, and will return in time to hold a public mass meeting for laboring men in Labor Union hall this evening.

Mr. Gram's attention was called by the reporter to the published accounts of his alleged mission to this mining district.

A Baker City paper has published a rather sensational article to the effect that the object of Mr. Gram's visit was to endeavor to induce the members of the Sumpter and Bourne miners' unions to sever their connection with the Western Federation of Miners and affiliate with the American Federation of Labor. In speaking of this story Mr. Gram said:

"I can not imagine how such an absurd story ever originated. While I was in Baker City this subject was never broached to me either by newspaper men or others. It is so absurd as to scarcely need attention, save that it might mislead those who are not acquainted with the objects of the American Federation of Labor.

"I have received no instructions from headquarters upon this subject whatever, and certainly would not on my own responsibility institute such a move. Instead of desiring the miners to sever their connection with the Western Federation of Miners, the American Federation of Labor has for some time been endeavoring to have that organization affiliate with the American Federation, as almost all other national and international labor unions are already affiliated, with the object of strengthening both organizations.

"This proposition has been received with considerable favor by many of the leading members of the miners' unions, and it may yet be accomplished. I am making a tour of the state in the interest of organized labor in general, and not to bring strife to existing unions."

### BANDIT LOVES CHRISTIANS.

Raissouli Says His Acts Were Not the Result of Hatred.

London, June 23.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Tangier, under date of June 19, says that a letter has been received from Raissouli in which the bandit says:

"It is well that the Englishmen and the Americans should know the truth regarding my doings and the reasons why I have taken Perdicaris. All that has been said at Tangier about me, as well as the statement that I hate the Christian Europeans and want to drive them from Morocco, is wrong.

"I desire to do no wrong to any Christian. Should trouble come it will come from Europe, for if troops are landed we will fight."

Raissouli lays the cause of the present trouble to the deposed governor of Tangier, who with his family persecuted Raissouli's tribe, killed boys, mutilated children and disregarded all the principles of their religion.

The legations here confidently anticipate the arrival of Perdicaris and Varley within two days.

### BARBER LAW TESTED.

Supreme Court Will Pass on Constitutionality of the Act.

Argument on the constitutionality of the barber law will begin in the supreme court next Tuesday, says the Oregon Daily Journal. The question has come before the highest tribunal of the state on appeal from the decision of Circuit Judge George, who held the law to be unconstitutional in the case of H. L. Briggs, on behalf of whom habeas corpus proceedings were instituted by Attorney Frank Grant.

The decision of Judge George was on the ground that the legislature had delegated its authority to the state board of barber examiners, instead of prescribing the qualifications of barbers itself.

Attorney Grant will conduct the argument for Briggs, the respondent, while Attorneys John F. Logan and R. W. Galloway of Portland, and John McNary of Salem, will represent the state board of barber examiners, which is the appellant.

District Attorney Manning and his former deputy, Arthur C. Spencer, appeared for the state in the circuit court, but will probably not go before the supreme court.

### HOW LOCAL OPTION WORKS.

Method of Procedure to Get a Vote on Liquor Question.

The local option law provides that when a petition signed by 10 per cent of the voters in any community is filed with the county clerk, he shall order an election to be held in the district in which the petition originated and that a majority vote shall decide whether the sale of liquors shall be permitted or denied.

The first Tuesday after the first Monday in November is the date set for the first election under the law, but it can be held only under proper petition as provided for in the act. After November local elections can be held only on the first Monday in

June of each year. If no election is held in November on petition none can be held except in each June thereafter.

The act is one passed under the initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution of the state and becomes a law as soon as the secretary of state announces a majority vote on the question at the last election.

Each locality in the state can avail itself of the law and declare for itself that it will have a special election to adopt it under the provisions required.

If a locality adopts the local option measure in November the prohibitory features take effect June 1, 1905. When a locality adopts the local option law in June the provisions of the act go into effect the July following.

### SKIN GRAFTING SUCCESSFUL.

Operation Upon Mrs. William Nave Promises Well.

Mrs. William Nave, who has been treated by skin grafting for a terrible burn, was dressed yesterday at St. Mary's hospital, says the Walla Walla Union. The grafting process was continued, the work being confined to the arm. About two-thirds of the burned surface is healed over now. The flesh is in a healthy condition, and the patient is gaining strength each day. She is now able to walk without assistance.
