BARBER LAW TESTED.

Supreme Court Will Pass on Constitutionality of the Act.

Argument on the constitutionality of the barber law will begin in the supreme court next Tuesday, says the Oregon Dally Journal. The question has come before the highest tribunal of the state on appeal from the de-cision of Circuit Judge George, who held the law to be unconstitutional in the case of H. L. Briggs, on behalf of whom habeas corpus proceedings were instituted by Attorney Frank proceedings

The decision of Judge George was on the ground that the legislature had delegated its authority to the state board of barber examiners, in-stead of prescribing the qualifications

of barbers itself.
Attorney Grant will conduct the ar gument for Briggs, the respondent, while Attorneys John F. Logan and While Attorneys John F. Jogan and John McNary of Salem, will represent the state board of barber examiners, which is the appellant.

HOW LOCAL OPTION WORKS.

Method of Procedure to Get a Vote on Liquor Question.

The local option law provides that of the voters in any community is filed with the county clerk, he shall order an election to be held in the district in which the petition origin-

district in which the petition originated and that a majority vote shall decide whether the sale of liquors shall be permitted or denied.

The first Tuesday after the first Monday in November is the date set for the first election under the law, but it can be held only under proper petition as provided for in the act. After November local elections can be held only on the first Monday in

lune of each year. If no election is held in November on petition none can be held except in each June

The act is one passed under the initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution of the state and secomes a law as soon as the secretary of state announces a majority vote on the question at the last elec-

Each locality in the state can avail itself of the law and declare for itself that it will have a special election to adont it under the provisions required.
