GENERAL NEWS.

The first through train to the central part of Africa was run yesterday.

Fifty thousand tailors of New York, to fight the "open shop" policy, will go on a strike.

The Grand American handicap shoot held at Indianapolis, closed yesterday. There were 163 entries.

Porto Ricans demand that the United States stop the butchering of their fellow islanders at San Domingo.

Butte will have no celebration the Fourth because the Socialists object to the city paying out money for decorations.

Secretary Taft has issued an order making the Dingley tariff applicable to the canal strip of the Isthmus of Panama.

The French minister at Hayti, who was recently stoned by a mob, has received an apology from the Haytian government.

The Jefferson Guards at the St. Louis fair will be armed with slugs, with full authority to use them in case of necessity.

Two Cripple Creek miners declare that General Bell had them strung up by the thumbs for four hours and otherwise barbarously maltreated them.

Because his wife, who was an invalid, must undergo a severe operation to save her life, Carl Schmidt, a mining promoter of New York, went home and blew out his brains.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Butte Miners' Union has voted \$25,000 in aid of the Colorado miners' strike.

There is over \$100,000,000 in coined money now stored in the San Francisco mint.

Seattle is about to build a municipal electric lighting sub-station that will cost \$18,000.

Slight frosts and in many places a "skiff" of snow fell in Montana June 23. Much damage to crops, especially fruit, resulted.

Ray Hilton fell from a railroad bridge near Mullan, Idaho, June 23, and his back was broken. He still lives in a hospital.

Plans have been completed for two bridges or viaducts in Seattle across Third and Fourth avenues, on Main and Jackson streets, to cost \$55,000.

William Shearer, a Helena, Mont., "yegg," was shot through the body, the bullet passing entirely through his heart. He ran a block and lived seven hours.

F. W. Nessly, of Prosser, Wash., has picked 165 crates of strawberries from one-third of an acre this summer, and 20 more crates are easily in sight yet on the same ground.

Taylor Siglin, the defeated democratic candidate for sheriff of Coos county, talks of contesting on the ground of fraudulent voting. The alleged majority against him was 87.

Alvin Meigs has been acquitted at Puyallup, of wilfully marrying another man's wife. His wife, Sarah McFerron, will now be tried on a charge of bigamy. Meigs is her third husband.

Herbert Haven, formerly of Seattle, died at Rampart, Alaska, March 26 last. It was supposed that he left a large amount of money, but his safety vault contained only nails. There is a strong suspicion of robbery after his death.

LABORERS' UNION.

Movement to Secure an Organization at Walla Walla.

The laborers of Walla Walla will unionize, says the Union.

The movement among the laborers to form a union for mutual protection has been in progress for several weeks, and a delay has occurred in securing a charter from headquarters, causing the promoters to become impatient. A day or two ago the charter arrived, and a meeting will be held at once to perfect the organization and elect officers. The meeting will likely be held at Labor hall Sunday evening.

Laborers claim that better wages and shorter hours have been secured by the trades becoming unionized, and hence there came to move among the men who demand labor for better conditions. Two preliminary meetings have been held, and nearly every laborer in the city has agreed to join the union at the first meeting.

MARCH TO TACOMA.

Hard Trip for the Negro Troopers at Fort Walla Walla.

Two hundred and fifty men and officers with 344 horses and mules, 16,000 pounds of baggage and eight wagons, have left Walla Walla overland for the American Lake encampment.

The troops took the Northern Pacific at Wallula, riding as far as Kennewick, and thus getting across the Columbia and avoiding long, tedious ferriage. Thence they will march to Easton, where wagons will be carried on the train to Palmer Junction. The men and animals, however, will march over the Cascades, performing what will probably prove an extremely difficult feat at this time of the year. Major J. B. Erwin is in command and thinks they can get through.

STOOD OFF THE POLICE.

Baker City Man With a Grudge and a Gun Proves Dangerous.

Peter McGovern, drunk and with a loaded Winchester, stood off the city marshal and others of the police force of Baker City, June 24. McGovern had started gunning for his step-father, Jack McCue, whom he accused of mistreating his mother. McGovern was finally outmaneuvered and disarmed and landed in jail. He is said to be inoffensive and peaceable when sober.

Will Burn Oil.

The oil-burning fixtures now being installed in the dyeing department in the Salem Woolen Mills will soon be completed. Thirteen barrels of California crude oil will be consumed daily when the plant is in operation. The mills are kept busy filling orders and turns 50,000 pounds of Oregon wool into marketable goods each month.—Salem Statesman.
