# TO ADVERTISE STATE

PORTLAND COMMERCIAL CLUB  
OUTLINES A GOOD PLAN.

Will Call a Convention to Be Held in Portland August 2d and 3d for Official Formation of a League—Will Form Central Body and Auxiliary Bodies All Over the State.

The East Oregonian is in receipt of a letter from Tom Richardson, the manager of the Portland Commercial club, which outlines in part a plan for the formation of an "Oregon Development League" for the advertisement of Oregon throughout the Union.

It is the purpose of the writer to make arrangements for the calling of a convention in Portland on August 2d and 3d under the auspices of the Portland Commercial club, for the official formation of the league. Every editor, mayor, county commissioner and president of any commercial association, or other body of men having the betterment of the state at heart will be given credentials as a delegate to the convention. It is the purpose to form one central body in Portland and many auxiliary bodies at every point over the state which shall work in harmony with the main organization.

W. D. Hasford, T. C. Taylor and R. Forster were present at the meeting held during the past week in Portland and state that the meeting there was very enthusiastic and the Portland people are willing to work hard for the success of the organization.

President J. A. Borie of the Commercial Association will attend the Portland convention when it is called, and will represent the association here in anything that may be necessary to be done.

## CHARGES OF GRAFT.

Good, Old-Fashioned Family Row in Progress at Baker City.

There are not merely rumors of war in Baker City, but the real thing, now that the city's street sprinkler, W. W. Cornwell has made a confession implicating the street commissioner, Tod Merwin, in a scheme which has been, so Cornwell claims, in operation for some time, and by which the city has been grafted in the street sprinkling service. Cornwell claims that under Merwin's direction he reported that he had done for the city enough sprinkling over and above what was actually done, to the cost of \$20 per month more than it received value for.

Merwin is putting up a big fight, claiming that Cornwell is altogether a liar in making the confession, and that he is in fact the dupe of one of the council, Mr. Ellis, who is chairman of the street committee, and who is incensed and revengeful because he cannot "run" Merwin. Merwin claims that Ellis is trying to get him ousted so he can secure the job of street commissioner for his (Ellis') father-in-law. Cornwell claims that his motive in "peaching" is a guilty conscience. He has lived in Baker City 15 years, and in that county much longer, while Merwin is a pioneer of the county and city, having resided therein much longer than Cornwell. The city council has the matter in hand, and an investigation is in progress.

## FREE CATTLE RANGE.

Kinkaid Bill Opens 8,844,757 Acres for Settlement.

Omaha, Neb., June 25.—Any citizen of the United States who is the head of a family and does not own more than 100 acres of land now has a chance to acquire a cattle ranch in Nebraska for nothing. Under the Kinkaid bill, which passed the last congress and becomes operative tomorrow, 8,844,757 acres, most of which comprise as fine grazing land as there is in the world, will be opened to the public as homesteads.

The lands affected by the Kinkaid bill have been open for homesteading in lots of 160 acres each, for many years, but, not being suitable for agricultural purposes, and 120 acres not being large enough on which to raise cattle, the lands have never been taken up by homesteaders. However, a square mile of this land will furnish pasture and feed for 100 head of cattle throughout the entire year.

Great tracts of this land have been fenced by the cattle barons of Nebraska, one concern having fenced in 2,000,000 acres of it. These large cattle ranches now have to give up the government land they have been using. This is the last large distribution of land that the government will ever make.

## Walla Walla Church Merger.

The congregations of the First Presbyterian and Cumberland Presbyterian churches of Walla Walla, have decided to consolidate the two bodies, the union to be effective July 1. Rev. J. R. Lamb resigned and will leave for the East. Services will be held after June 26 in the First Presbyterian church. The plan to consolidate has been in contemplation several months. Just what will be done with the extra building and parsonage has not been determined.

## Morrow County Grain.

The warm and favorable weather is fast ripening grain everywhere and harvest will commence early this season. In the Lexington and Lone districts, the heading of barley has already commenced. In Morrow county this season there is every indication that the wheat crop will be a record breaker.—Heppner Gazette.

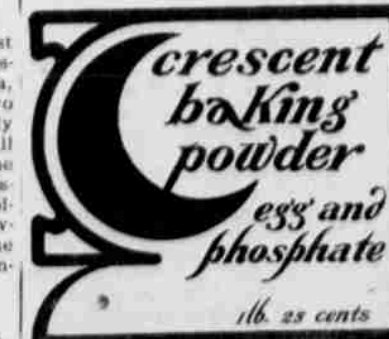
