EXPERT OPINIONS

RAILROAD OFFICIALS VIEW EASTERN OREGON.

The Inland Empire From End to End and Side to Side, is This Year One of the World's Fairest Spots to Look Upon and Reside Within—A Land of Magnificent Crops and Thriving and Rapidly Growing Towns.

R. Burns, general agent of the O. R. & N. line, with headquarters in Walla Walla, and Colonel R. C. Judson, industrial agent of the same road, are in Portland, says the Oregon Daily Journal, after an inspection trip to Eastern Oregon, Eastern Washington and North Idaho—an inquiry which has demonstrated to their satisfaction that the present year's crops are to be the biggest grown in the history of that section of wonderful yields of grain and fruit.

"Conditions in that section were never better than at present; and the acreage is larger than usual," said Mr. Burns. "At present the weather is most favorable. The country has had plenty of rain, and because of the cool, late spring and the continuation of much snow in the mountains, not hot blasting winds are anticipated."

"Among the counties I have visited are Umatilla, Walla Walla, Columbia, Garfield, Franklin and Adams, and the district of North Idaho near Moscow. In all that territory there will be more than an average yield of wheat, and the fruit crop is also all that could be desired."

"In the city of Walla Walla much improvement is under way. A four-story modern brick office building with elevator service is being put up by J. E. Ransom, a traveling man. The Drumheller company will put up a large three-story brick building in the fall. The new Carnegie library and the new city hall are also to be built this year. Besides this, the city will shortly pave 12 blocks of the city streets and intersecting cross streets."

"Pendleton I found to also be in a prosperous condition. P. Bowman, a rancher, is putting up a fine three-story brick hotel there. Mayor Matlock is erecting a fine brick block next to the hotel. Two brick blocks are going up on Court street, and a great many smaller structures are in process of erection."

Regarding his trip Colonel Judson said:

"I was especially impressed with the fine general conditions in and about the new town of Echo, Ore., although the country for many miles is in fine shape."

"At Echo the new ditch will place 10,000 acres available for alfalfa planting. At present this is the chief point on the O. R. & N. for feeding and shipping livestock; and today at Echo 33 cars of cattle are being loaded for the Chicago market. Each way from Echo is 50 miles of good land—land suitable for wheat, alfalfa, peaches, apricots, nectarines, plums, pears, quinces and grapes—all of which are favored by an excellent climate."

"The farmers of that locality are a wideawake lot of people, and at the meeting of their commercial club on April 30, there were 711 in attendance, although the club had been organized only last spring, and all were present that they might get benefit from practical lessons taught in diversified farming—dairying, the growing of grasses and fodder, and methods for getting the best possible results from the soil."

"In Heppner, George Conser, of the First National bank, told me that the wheat prospects were far better than

they were last year, and that the indications were that the Heppner division would produce 1,000,000 bushels of wheat this year."

"As for the LaCrosse and Connell divisions, I found that where the average yield of wheat last year was seven bushels to the acre, it is estimated at 30 bushels this year. But, of course, this is a remarkable increase, favored by the late spring and the moisture. This is the section that hopes to get aid from the big irrigation scheme of the government."

"All things considered, I should say this territory contiguous to Portland bids fair to have the best year in its history and the people are justified in being jubilant."
