 A. J. Miner, who lives at Canyon on the Sumpter Valley pass, returned from the Oregon Pioneer's Association meeting at Indian War Veterans, says Miner is among the oldest residents of the state. With his parents he crossed the plains in 1845, and across the Yaquina, Wash. It was in 1855, when he was only 10 years old, that he distinguished himself in the wars which the Yaki and other tribes waged against the settlers. He is an honored member of the Pioneer's Association of the Society of Veterans of the Pacific Indians Wars. Mr. Miner is now 67 years old, is hale and hearty, and bids fair to live to the century limit. Mr. Miner is a resident of the John Day river for 25 years.

Pheasant Bill Failed.
 In answer to an inquiry from Game Warden J. W. Baker, Attorney General Crawford has rendered an opinion in which he holds that the pheasant bill of 1903 did not become a law. This has been the generally accepted opinion. Although the bill was signed by the presiding officer of each house, approved by the governor and filed in the office of the secretary of state, the records show that it received only 10 votes in the house, or one less than a majority, and, therefore, it did not pass the house.—The Dalles Chronicle.
