MAKE GOOD CATCH AT COEUR D'ALENE LAKE.

AT HOT LAKE.

Pendleton Contractors Have Contract for Foundation.

Moussu & Co. are now at Hot Lake putting in the foundation for the new hotel building which Senator Pierce is building there. The new structure will be 165 feet in length with one L 140 feet long and another 130 feet long. The material in the foundation is stone quarried from the foothills near by. The new building, which will be virtually an extension of the old building, will contain 100 rooms. It adjoins the old building on the eastern end, and will cost, finished and furnished, about \$80,000.

There is no certainty that the new building will be finished in time to accommodate any of this season's business, but it will be pushed to completion this year beyond a doubt. The additional room it will afford is badly needed, as the old building is crowded to its utmost capacity. The imperative need of more room is what led to the projection of the new building.

PROSPEROUS WALLOWA.

Man Who Carried His Blankets to That Valley is Now the Sheep King.

Enterprise, Ore., June 27.—Seventeen years ago, an illiterate French-Canadian walked into Wallowa valley in search of a job.

All he had was the roll of blankets on his shoulder. He didn't even have an education, but he did have good horse sense—and thrift. He had left the O. R. & N. Co. where he had worked on one of the section gangs and gone as a farm hand to Grande Ronde valley. He thought the chances would be better in Wallowa county, so he walked in.

When he came he didn't own land enough to spread his blankets on. Now he can pick a good spot to spread his blankets on a tract of 7900 acres, all of which he owns.

From a man with a roll of blankets in search of a job, he has become the heaviest taxpayer in Wallowa county. He has sold all but 19,000 of his sheep. He runs a machine shearing sheep camp and operates 49 machines.

Any man who has been in Wallowa county 15 years and is in poor circumstances, is either a poor manager or has had adverse luck. If Pete Beaudou, an unlettered French-Canadian, can, in 17 years, make what he has, any man should make a good living here.—Fred Lockley.
