### GENERAL NEWS.

Charles A. Griffith, a wealthy merchant from Nebraska City, in California for his health, fell from a wagon at Fresno, and broke his neck, killing him.

Guayaquil, Ecuador, is in the hands of an uncontrollable mob of the populace, which is incensed at an exorbitant raise in the water rates, and poor service.

Herman T. Witte is dead at Yonkers, N. Y. He was the largest manufacturer of elevator machinery in the United States, and known to contracting builders everywhere.

John J. Jennings, a New York electrician, foretold the manner of his death several days before it occurred. By an unexpected jam in the streets, he was crowded in front of an engine and run over.

A certain amount of tariff reciprocity between Canada and Germany is expected before many months, an arrangement that will tend to weaken the United States' present great commercial advantages in Canada.

All expressions by labor organizations in the east on the Colorado troubles are strongly sympathetic with the miners' side of the question, and they have been voted aid and sympathy at many unexpected points.

John G. Milburn, who was president of the Buffalo Exposition, is dubious about the re-election of Roosevelt, although he is a radical republican. He states that the detection of the labor unions is underestimated by the republican managers.

J. B. Tyler is dead in Chicago. He is believed to have been the youngest Confederate soldier who served through the civil war and carried arms. He was a cavalryman and enlisted in 1861 at the age of 12, in the First Maryland cavalry.

C. Fatterwhite, of Portland, committed suicide Tuesday by taking carbolic acid.

The next convention of the Washington Christian Endeavor Society will be held at Lewiston in 1906.

The public swimming pools and baths will be opened to the public for the season on Thursday, July 1.

Mrs. Maud R. Barton, of Lewiston, was poisoned by eating ice cream Tuesday. She is in a critical condition.

The White House Inn, the famous country hotel and resort near Portland, was totally destroyed by fire Monday night, loss \$20,000.

At Nanaimo Tuesday, the thermometer dropped from 81 degrees above freezing to freezing in four hours, following a severe electrical storm.

The Wasco Warehouse Milling Company has let a contract for new buildings to increase the output of the mills from 600 barrels per day to 1200.

Edwin Jones, employed on a log drive, was drowned in the Payette river near Emmett, Idaho, June 27. He was a stranger and 35 years of age.

The fruit outlook in all parts of Idaho, for every variety, is fine, except for heavy and destructive frosts in the Boise valley and around Emmett.

M. C. Cheal, a commission merchant and prominent society man of Portland, has disappeared and it is thought he has drowned himself, as he was about \$1600 short in his accounts.

### BURNED TO DEATH.

Clothes Ignited by Explosion of Kerosene Lamp.

North Yakima, Wash., June 29.—Mrs. William Maxwell of Yakima City met a horrible death by burning last night about 10 o'clock. A lamp she was carrying into a bedroom exploded, throwing blazing oil over her clothing. She ran out on the street to a neighbor's, the wind fanning the flames into a large blaze as she went along. When she reached the front gate of Mrs. Flora Adkins' house her clothes were almost burned off. Mrs. Adkins' son came up with a bucket of water and threw the contents on her, extinguishing the flames. She died in awful agony at 3 a. m.

Mr. Maxwell was not at home, and when the explosion occurred Mrs. Maxwell ran out and left her child alone in the burning house. Charles Adkins rushed to the burning building barely in time to save the child. The husband had come up, but through excitement forgot his child. The house was totally destroyed.

Mrs. Maxwell was about 34 years old.

### CATTLE ARE DYING.

Believed to Be Due to Eating a Poisonous Weed.

Fifteen head of cattle belonging to Peter Weber and five or six belonging to Drake & Jordan have died in the past 10 days or two weeks, up Quigley gulch, a short distance east of town, says the Halley (Idaho) News-Miner.

Mr. Weber was up there yesterday, and on his return to town reported that one of his steers died while he was there. The animal fell over and died in about 30 minutes.

He does not think larkspur is the cause of the fatalities. He says that bleeding a reasonable time after the stock have eaten the weed will effect a cure generally. But in this case stock die anyway, whether bled or not. He is at a loss to account for these wholesale deaths, but thinks the stock must be poisoned by some weed.

If stock remains in that gulch he is afraid it will all die, and the cattle will be driven out of that vicinity and across to the west side of the valley, possibly up Hot Springs gulch.

There are 1100 acres of nutmeg melons growing in the Yakima valley this season. A rate of \$2 per 100 pounds to Minneapolis and \$2.35 to Chicago has been secured on 20,000 pound lots.

### INDIAN ORGIES.

Northwest Tribes Preparing for the Big Feast Near Butte.

Butte, Mont., June 29.—Delegations from the Flathead, Snake, Chippewas, Blackfeet and Lemhi tribes of Indians are in attendance at the "sacred" dance given this year by the Crees at the Hump, about 14 miles west of Butte.

Each year one of the tribes of northwest Indians holds a conclusive war is considered by the redskins to be the greatest period in the year. The dance lasts for two days and nights, and is for the purpose of perpetuating in the minds of the young warriors the heroic deeds of their forefathers.

The beating of tomtoms and weird tooting of whistles of the Indians can be heard for miles about the Hump. As many as 50 Indians engage in the

dance at once, continuing until they drop exhausted. Other Indians stand ready to take the places of the warriors who drop.
