HELPS THE ACADEMY

COLLEGE BOARD GIVES TO
PENDLETON INSTITUTION.

Application of the Board of Trustees of Pendleton Academy for Assistance is Granted and \$1020 is Guaranteed for the Coming Year—Academy is Now in First-Class Condition—This Gift a Surprise.

Rev. W. L. Van Nuys, secretary of the board of trustees of Pendleton academy, has just received a letter from E. C. Ray, acting secretary of the College Board of the Presbyterian church of the United States, that the request of the trustees for assistance for the academy had just been granted and that the academy would receive \$1020 from the general educational fund for next year, beginning in September.

This is the best news yet received by the academy, as it is an unqualified endorsement of the institution by the highest authorities in the church, and stands as a recommendation that can not be gainsaid.

The board of trustees feel highly elated over the success of their request for funds, as they had not depended upon outside help, largely, but had determined to carry the institution through on an independent basis.

With this additional fund, the institution can start in the coming term with the highest prospects for success, and the active canvass for students will at once begin.

This endorsement of the academy by the church authorities will also stimulate local churches in the Oregon and Washington presbyteries, to lend a more ready support and take more active interest in its affairs.

With the rearrangement of the academy, in which the lower grades have been eliminated, and the purely academic work is made the leading and prime feature of the institution, it promises to appeal to a larger class of young people in Eastern Oregon and Washington, who desire an academic education after their graduation from the various high schools.

Rev. W. H. Bleakney, principal of the academy, will make a tour of the Eastern Oregon counties before the opening of the school year, in the interest of the institution.

"A GOOD SHOW."
