TEACHERS' MEETING

THOUSANDS FROM ALL OVER UNITED STATES.

Meet for Educational Discussions and Are Shown the Sights of the Exposition—Sectional Conferences Prove of Great Interest and Benefit—is the Biggest Convention in Point of Numbers in St. Louis This Year.

St. Louis, Mo., June 29.—The annual convention of the National Educational Association is proving to be the biggest convention held in St. Louis this summer and it is also the largest gathering ever held by the association. The attendance was considerably augmented by the arrival of numerous belated delegates last night and during the early hours this morning. The register at headquarters shows that there is scarcely a locality in the entire country that is not represented among the thousands of delegates.

The general sessions were resumed at 9:15 o'clock this morning. The program included the presentation of papers as follows: "The New Departure in Secondary Education," J. J. Shepard, principal of the High School of Commerce of New York City; "The Place of the Small College," President George A. Gates of Pomona college; "Educational Possibilities for the Country Child in the United States," O. J. Kern, superintendent of schools of Winnebago county, Ill.

No general session of the convention was held this afternoon. A large majority of the delegates devoted the time to sightseeing at the exposition and to an inspection of the numerous educational exhibits. Those who were not thus employed took part in the numerous sectional conferences where special branches of educational work were exhaustively discussed. As at previous conventions of the association these side conferences are proving to be among the most valuable and interesting features of the gathering. All of them are well attended and the speakers include scores of the foremost educators of America.

The program calls for a general meeting this evening at which the chief speaker will be Halsey C. Ives, chief of the department of art of the exposition. Mr. Ives will tell the teachers of the art exhibits in the exposition. The general sessions will be resumed tomorrow morning.

der in the Auditorium this afternoon with an attendance of over 2000 delegates. The convention will nominate a candidate for governor to succeed John F. Hill. The withdrawal of Colonel Joseph H. Manley from the race and the probability that the old party machine of which he was the kingpin will be overthrown by the new leaders who have come to the front during the last few years causes an unusual amount of interest to center in the convention. All indications point to the nomination of William T. Cobb, of Rockland, for governor. His chief opponent is Colonel Charles H. Prescott, of Biddeford.

PROHIBITIONISTS.

Have Met to Nominate a Candidate for President.

Indianapolis, June 29.—The prohibition national convention was called to order in Tomlinson hall at 10 o'clock this morning by Chairman Stewart, of the national committee. About 2500 delegates occupied the main floor of the convention hall, while the galleries were crowded with several thousand spectators, many of them from distant parts of the country. The hall was festooned with flags and bunting. A conspicuous feature of the decorations was a large oil portrait of General Nelson A. Miles.

The proceedings of the opening session were purely of a routine character. The only life that was injected into the session was the enthusiastic applause that greeted the appearance of Chairman Stewart and other national leaders on the platform. Following the invocation and address of welcome a temporary organization was effected. The usual committees on credentials, etc. were appointed and adjournment was then taken until 2 o'clock this afternoon, when the convention assembled to perfect a permanent organization and to transact miscellaneous business. The nominations will not be made until tomorrow afternoon.

CHRISTIAN UNION.

Juvenile Order of the United Presbyterian Church.

St. Joseph, Mo., June 29.—Visitors wearing badges of blue and gold are much in evidence in St. Joseph today. They number more than 2900 altogether and from the attendance at the national convention of the Young Peoples' Christian Union of the United Presbyterian Church, which will be in session here during the next four days. Nearly every state and territory is represented among the delegates.

The convention will be formally opened in the Tootle theater this evening with a welcome meeting. Rev. M. Little, of Chicago, president of the organization, will preside and the addresses of the evening will be delivered by Rev. T. D. Edgar, of Cambridge, O. Governor Mickey, of Nebraska; Rev. J. G. Kennedy, of Denver; Rev. W. A. Spaulding, of Seattle, and Rev. P. A. Baker, president of the National Anti-Saloon League, are among the distinguished speakers to be heard during the week.

PALOUSE HOSPITAL OPENED.

Institution Will Be Conducted Under Catholic Auspices.

Palouse, Wash., June 29.—The Palouse general hospital swung open its doors this morning. Two patients sought its protection, S. J. Kelly, injured in an accident at the Potlatch mill, and Frank Revelle, suffering with inflammatory rheumatism. The building is nearly all furnished.

The hospital will be under the care of Sister Helen Waugh, who for two years was in the Mary Drexel home at Philadelphia.

Dr. Hein will be in charge of the place and Dr. Armstrong of Spokane will be the surgeon for the hospital.

CAMP MEETING CLOSED.

Christian Church Conducts Very Successful Revival.

Culdesac, Idaho, June 29.—The Christian camp meeting, which has been in progress here during the past 10 days, closed last night. Those in attendance, says this was the best camp meeting ever held in Nez Perce county. The attendance throughout was large. Last night when the meeting was dismissed there were over 80 camps on the ground. The camp meeting was notable for the perfect order maintained.

WANT HERDER TO MOVE ON.

Delamar Citizens Protest on Presence of Sheep.

Boise, Idaho, June 29.—Trouble is threatened near the mining town of Delamar over the pollution of two streams by sheep. The streams are a supply place for herders with large bands of sheep. The herders refuse to move on at the request of citizens, consequently there are threats that the bands will be cleaned out.

Missouri Democrats.

Joplin, Mo., June 29.—The democratic state convention, the second of the series of three state conventions to be held in Missouri this year, assembled in Joplin today. The present convention will select delegates at large and district delegates to the St. Louis national convention. Resolutions will probably be passed indorsing Senator Cockrell for the presidential nomination.

California Endeavorers.

Santa Rose, Cal., June 29.—With "Missions and Evangelism" as their rallying cry, more than 1000 enthusiastic young Christian Endeavorers of California have gathered here for their annual state convention. The attendance breaks all records in the history of the society in this state. During the five days the convention will be in session many speakers of note and prominence will be heard.
