### ADDRESS BY GRAM

PRESIDENT OF OREGON STATE FEDERATION.

He Will Speak at Milarkey Hall, Corner Garden and Court, Tonight at 8 O'clock—Eight Unions in Pendleton, With a Membership of 400—Progress and Status of the Union Labor Cause in Eastern Oregon.

Union labor organizations will be addressed at Milarkey hall, Court and Garden streets, tonight at 8 o'clock, by C. H. Gram, president of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, who arrived here last night on one of his regular tours in the interest of the central body.

There are at present eight unions, comprising a membership of 400, in Pendleton: typographers, carpenters, wool sorters, clerks, plumbers, teamsters, painters, bricklayers and stone masons.

In addition to being the official head of the state organization, Mr. Gram is general organizer for the American Federation of Labor. He left Portland which is his headquarters, about two weeks ago, and has visited Sumpter, Baker City, Bourne and La Grande. He will leave here for Portland and after the Fourth will return to The Dalles.

"The unions generally are in flourishing condition," said Mr. Gram. "So far as organization is concerned, Sumpter is quiet, but otherwise the town is all right. The strength of the organizations in a number of places has been increased, while on this trip the painters were unionized at La Grande and the teamsters and building laborers at Baker City. The painters' union at La Grande went to pieces a year ago, but has now taken

on a fresh lease of life. There is a possibility that two or three more unions will be formed there.

"I believe the time is coming when the A. F. of L., the Western Federation of Miners and the A. L. U. will be united. It must come in time. A story was printed that my mission to Eastern Oregon was to persuade the local unions to secede from the Western Federation and affiliate with the A. F. of L., and I came near being mobbed. I explained there was no truth in the story and was treated royally afterward."

It is reported by Mr. Gram that 80 unions are now affiliated with the state federation. This is an increase of about 22 or 23 unions over last year. While strengthening union forces in this city today he was accompanied by G. S. B. Hayden, a personal friend, who is identified prominently with the union cause.

The officers of the Trades and Labor Assembly of Pendleton, in which all the labor unions of the city are united, are: President, E. D. Tramplesure, of the Woolsorters' Union; secretary, L. E. Wenham, of the Typographical Union.

He is receiving congratulations from many friends here. He will probably leave to take up his work at Oxford the latter part of August or the first of September.

### \$1500 COST OF TOURNAMENT

RECEIPTS AND CREDITS MAKE AN EVEN ACCOUNT.

Confarr Leads With the High Average, While Ellis is Second—Several Others Crowd Them Closely in the Percentage Column—Twenty-five Thousand Targets Were Not Used—It Cost Between \$500 and \$600 to Fit Up the Grounds.

Averages of all the marksmen who took part in and finished in the recent Northwest tournament have been completed by the secretary. Confarr is in the lead, with a percentage of 94.82, E. E. Ellis being a close second with 93.29. Several have percentages higher than 92.

Exclusive of targets, the expenses of the tournament aggregated about \$1500. The receipts will just about balance this expenditure. This is true only when 25,000 targets, which were not used, are taken into consideration, as they practically amount to cash in hand. The expense of fitting up the grounds was between \$600 and \$700. The additional cost of targets over and above the \$1500 mentioned was about \$800.

Last of the Famous Captain William Martin Estate Disposed of This Morning.

One of the nicest real estate deals made in Pendleton this season was consummated by E. T. Wade & Son this morning, when they deeded the Captain William Martin house on the corner of Johnson and Webb, now occupied by F. W. Hendley and W. T. Rigby, to Mrs. Minnie Lazinka, of Camas prairie, for the neat sum of \$4,000.

The deal has been on hand for some time, and last evening when Mr. Lazinka arrived in the city with

the herd of Camas prairie beef cattle, the details were arranged and this morning the transfer was made. Mrs. Lazinka purchasing the place and taking immediate possession. The present tenants will continue to occupy the property during the summer and Mrs. Lazinka will move to the city this winter to take advantage of Pendleton public schools.

This sale closes out the famous William Martin estate, the other houses on the block having been sold some time ago by Wade & Son—the one on the corner of Webb and Thompson street, now occupied by Mrs. William Mays, to Mrs. Teel, of Echo, and the two cottages on Johnson street to Robert Laine, the entire property aggregating about \$10,000.
