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SAVE WATER SUPPLY

IDAHO SHEEPMEN PROTECT CITIZENS' RIGHTS.

Sheep That Have Encroached on DeLamar Water Sources to Be Immediately Removed—Association Will Not Stand for Any Member Who Violates Common Rules of the Country—Plain Talk From Montie B. Gwinne to Citizens.

Immediately upon receipt of information that sheep were being herded along the streams from which the town of DeLamar obtains its water supply, steps were taken by the Idaho Woolgrowers' Association to have the flocks withdrawn from that locality, says the Boise Statesman.

Secretary Montie B. Gwinne of the association promptly telephoned to a representative in De Lamar, requesting the latter to at once ascertain who the owners of the flocks were in order that the association might notify them to move their sheep without delay.

"The woolgrowers' association can not support those of its members who become involved in litigation growing out of encroachments of this character," said Mr. Gwinne.

"It is very doubtful if the owners of the sheep which are reported to be grazing along the streams near DeLamar are aware of the locality of their flocks. We can only conjecture who these owners are but directly their names are obtained they will be notified to seek other grazing ground immediately. Should they fail to do so they can not expect the association to stand behind them in any legal controversy which may follow.

"The chances are that the herders of the sheep permitted their flocks to wander on forbidden ground without knowing where they were at and the owners of the sheep are doubtless ignorant of what has happened. Were they aware that their flocks were encroaching upon the sources of DeLamar's water supply they would, I am firmly convinced, have the sheep driven away instantly.

"We are doing all we possibly can to remove the alleged cause of offense to the people of DeLamar. It is the policy of the Idaho Woolgrowers' Association to avoid giving offense or causing annoyance to any citizen or community and in this instance no time will be wasted in getting at the facts and finding a remedy."

ing canal and the cold water system of the Boise Artesian Hot & Cold Water Company at a total cost of \$290,000, the lowest figure submitted by the owners of the property. Of this amount the canal company will receive \$70,000 and the water company \$220,000, in case the deal is consummated.

The report is voluminous, detailing the steps that had been taken to examine the title to the property, which was found perfect, and the estimates of different engineers of the value of the plant and canal.

The cost of laying the pipe lines, gates and fittings of the water company is estimated at \$216,574.41; the value of the entire holdings of the company involved in the proposed purchase, according to the estimate of the water company's engineer, is placed at \$347,389.14.

The real estate embraced in the deal includes 320 acres adjoining the city in Hull's gulch that may be used for a city park; 150 feet frontage on Front street at the corner of Thirteenth, with shops and dwelling houses thereon, and about three acres near the Natatorium, upon which the plant and wells are situated, and the right of perpetual use of the ground on the east side for underground passages for increasing the water supply.

BOISE HAS A STRIKE.

Plumbers Walk Out and Masters Will Employ Non-Union Men.

Boise, July 1.—The trouble which has been brewing for several days between the plumbers and the master plumbers reached a climax this afternoon when the latter met and agreed to not recognize the union, but to conduct open shops from now on. Plumbing work has been stopped on all buildings now in course of construction.

The master plumbers are confident that they can get men to take the places of those who have gone out and that the suspension of business will last only for a few days.

Just what effect this will have on the other trades' unions is not known at this time. The union is not affiliated with the general trades' council and it is not probable that that body will call out a sympathetic strike of the other trades.

The trouble between the plumbers and the master plumbers has been brewing for some time. A few days ago a man by the name of Walters commenced to work for James Lusk. His work was unsatisfactory and he was paid off. Later the union took the matter up and demanded that he be given work. This was refused and the plumbers in all of the shops were called out.

SHEEP DYING ON RANGE.

Five Hundred Lost by One Montana Firm.

Big Timmer, Mont., July 1.—Sheep are dying on the range in large numbers near Springdale. As far as can be ascertained at this time the cause is not known, but it is presumed to be poison, either from poisonous weeds or plants, or other growth, which sheep have been eating. The dead sheep are the property of the Briggs & Ellis Sheep Company, which has extensive interests in this section, and also near Custer.

It is stated that the number of dead sheep reached over 500. The range where the dead sheep lay is said to have been used for grazing for a long time, and the presence of any poisonous weed was wholly unknown.
