### Pioneer's Remains Found.

The remains of Hiram J. Bickford, who disappeared November 8, 1863, was found early last week by a Chinese shepherd in the employ of George H. Beck, a sheepman residing on the headwaters of Cottonwood creek in the northwest part of Grant county. The Chinaman found the remains about two miles south of Mr. Beck's residence and only a few hundred yards from the cabin occupied by him.

Only a small part of the remains were discovered, but the identification was complete, as numerous papers found in the clothing which were in very good condition and which were carefully examined by Mr. Beck, Newton Smith and others, proved that the remains were those of Mr. Bickford. As soon as possible a casket was procured and the remains were taken to the cemetery in Fox valley and interred.—Grant County News.

### Pest of Squirrels.

Farmers report that the ground squirrels are more numerous this year than ever before and that they are experiencing great difficulty in holding them in check. Some have suggested that the county or state provide a small bounty on their hides to encourage sportsmen to aid in exterminating the pest.—Culdesac correspondence in Lewiston Tribune.

### NOME'S SPRING CLEAN-UP.

Over a Million and a Quarter Taken Out During Winter Months. Nome's spring clean-up of gold will aggregate \$1,337,000, according to the Nome Nugget, which has published a "special clean-up edition," a copy of which came to the Star this morning by the steamer Roanoke. Major "Jack" Strong, editor of the Nugget, is a pioneer of the camp, and one of the best posted mining authorities in Alaska, says the Seattle Star.

Editorially he states that the banner gulches of the Seward peninsula have been Anvil-Dexter and Dry creeks and Solomon river, the output of the three aggregating \$800,000.

In a recapitulation of the results of the winter's work in the various camps, the Nugget says:

"Great care has been taken by the Nugget to obtain an approximate amount of gold that has been mined from placers during the past winter on Seward peninsula. The best posted miners on the various creeks have been consulted, and a Nugget representative visited nearly every working claim during the latter part of the winter, and as a result of these sources of information, we are enabled to give an estimate, in round figures, of the 'clean-up' as given below:
