WILL DISCUSS RANGE ISSUES

LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION
 MEETS LAND COMMISSION.

Topic of Ranges and Forests Will Be
 Discussed in Denver on August 3,
 4 and 5, by stockmen and Govern-
 ment Officials—Vital Matter of
 Range Distribution Must Be Set-
 tled Soon in the Interest of the
 Stock and Farm Interests.

Denver, Col., July 8.—Recognizing
 that there are no questions of greater
 importance to stockmen of the United
 States than an amicable settlement
 of the question of grazing on the pub-
 lic lands and forest reserves, the Na-
 tional Livestock Association at its
 convention in 1900 adopted a resolu-
 tion providing for a committee to
 draft bills which would provide for
 the leasing of the public range and
 the use of forest reserves under cer-
 tain restrictions.

The people of the grazing states at
 that time were not ready to accept a
 change in the conditions which had
 existed since the stockraising had be-
 come one of the leading industries of
 the country and consequently the ini-
 tial effort failed.

The association, however, has been
 prosecuting a diligent campaign of
 education along these lines ever since
 and at this time because of the re-
 stricted range and unsatisfactory con-
 ditions under which the forest re-
 serves are conducted, the stockmen
 are apparently ready to get together
 and decide upon some policy which
 will be satisfactory to all concerned,
 realizing that conditions are changing
 so rapidly that it is only a question
 of time when this will be compulsory.

At the annual meeting of the as-
 sociation in Kansas City in 1903, res-
 olutions were adopted asking Presi-
 dent Roosevelt to appoint a commis-
 sion to investigate these matters with
 a view of securing data which would
 permit the drafting of a bill satisfac-
 tory to the cattle and sheep interests.

This commission has been appoint-
 ed and is now desirous of securing all
 the information on this subject possi-
 ble, and with this end in view will
 meet with the stockmen at the head-
 quarters of the National Livestock As-
 sociation in Denver in August. It is
 desired by this commission, as well as
 the officers of the association, that all
 persons who are interested in the
 grazing propositions and forest re-
 serves, will be present at this meet-
 ing. The following letter, which was
 issued from the headquarters of the
 association, is self-explanatory:

"Dear Sir:
 "Upon the request of the National
 Livestock Association, President
 Roosevelt last December appointed a
 commission consisting of Hon. W. A.
 Richards, commissioners of the gen-
 eral land office; Hon. Gifford Pinchot,
 chief forester; and Hon. F. H. New-
 ell, chief of the department of geolog-
 ical survey, for the purpose of inves-
 tigating conditions existing in arid
 and semi-arid states in so far as graz-
 ing lands and forest reserves are con-
 cerned, and to report to the presi-
 dent before the convening of congress
 in December next.

"The object of this investigation is
 the formation of a report to the presi-
 dent, which it is hoped will result in
 the drafting of a bill for the amicable
 adjustment of these important mat-
 ters.

"The chairman of the commission
 has advised the officers of this as-
 sociation that they will meet with the
 stockmen of the west at the head-
 quarters of the National Livestock
 Association, 211 Quincy building, Den-
 ver, Colorado, on August 3, 4 and 5,
 1904, for the purpose of considering
 these subjects and gathering such in-
 formation as is possible.

 committee of the senate, and Hon.

 as other prominent citizens.

"There are no questions that are of
 greater importance to the stockmen
 than those of grazing on the public
 lands and forest reserves, and it is de-
 sirable that some united action shall
 be made upon congress at a very early
 date. For these reasons you are ear-
 nestly requested to appoint three prom-
 inent members of your association,
 who are interested in these matters,
 to attend this meeting, and we would
 ask that you notify the secretary of
 this association immediately, whether
 or not this request can be complied
 with, and the names and addresses of
 those who will be here.

FOR CARNIVAL KING.

Eight Candidates Engaged in the
 Struggle of Their Lives.

The race for the king of the
 Eagles' carnival, which begins July
 11, is on. Among those placed in
 nomination yesterday were Lee
 Teutsch, T. D. Taylor, E. J. Sommer-
 ville, Colonel C. E. Roosevelt, Leon
 Cohen, Colonel James H. Raley, Judge

 not be counted until next Monday

 Derrenberger, one of its agents, is
 now at work in this city making pre-

 the company and its features.

Vari-colored posters are now being
 tacked up throughout the county ad-

MONEY IN CIRCULATION.

Is Greater Than Ever in the History
 of the Country.

The amount of money now in cir-
 culation in the United States is greater
 than ever before. Roughly speaking,
 it amounts to about \$2,500,000,000,
 of which 17.2 per cent is in national bank
 notes, and 43.6 per cent is in gold or
 gold certificates. Our stock of money
 is nearly as large as that of Great
 Britain, France and Austria-Hungary
 combined, or as that of France and
 Germany combined.

The amount of money in circulation
 has increased more rapidly than the
 population.

From 1890 to 1900 the advance in
 our population was from 62,622,250 to
 76,295,220, an increase of 21.8 per
 cent. The wealth of our people
 amounted from \$65,037,091,000 to \$94,-
 300,000,000, an increase of 44.9 per
 cent.

In the meantime the money in cir-
 culation rose from \$1,420,251,270 to
 \$2,055,150,998, an increase of 43.7 per
 cent. Since 1900 there has been an
 increase in the circulating medium of
 \$434,592,046, or 20.9 per cent, and an
 annual average of 4.2 per cent. In the
 same interval the population has in-
 creased 7.1 per cent, or only 1.8 per
 cent a year.

Van Vranken-Black.

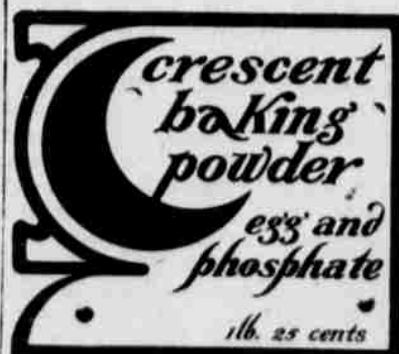
The wedding of Homer W. Black
