

INCREASED WHEAT YIELD.

Light Land Will Produce 20 to 30 Bushels This Year.

The light land north of Yoakum erage,

around which the banks drew a "dead line" during the hard times of 1894 has increased in productiveness each year, until it has now come to be one of the most profitable wheatgrowing districts in the county.

Ordinarily this light land produces 15, 18, and in some cases as high as bushels per acre, and some of it 26 also running as low as 10 to 12 bush-This year almost every crop in 618. that district promises to yield from 22 to 30 bushels of a high grade wheat. What has been threshed has yielded about 25 bushels, and the remaining crops will average as high, or perhaps a few bushels higher than this.

Farmers have noted the increasing productiveness of this district, with considerable interest. Without any apparent cause other than that the adland is being cultivated, all olning that light land is becoming more and more certain of a crop, and the yield is constantly increasing. Those who reside there reason that in time the cultivation of that dry land will so increase its fertility that it will be one of the surest crop districts in the county

CANNERIES ARE NEEDED.
