GENERAL NEWS.

The rate of increase of the negro in the United States was considerably less during the 19th century than it is supposed to have been during the 18th century.

Seven thousand truck drivers in the employ of the New York Truck Owners' Association, are expected to strike. They claim the employers have violated all agreements.

William Noerling, of Brooklyn, N. Y., shot and killed his wife and then himself, while in a jealous rage. The couple had five children, all present when the shooting took place.

Certificates of stocks and bonds with a value of \$208,000, were lately found in an old store room of a Greenwich street hotel in New York. There is absolutely no clue to their ownership.

Charles J. Denny, member of the St. Louis city council, is the third member of that body to plead guilty to accepting bribes for his vote and influence on a city lighting deal. Nineteen members were indicted.

Owing to falling health, Henry Rustin, chief mechanical and electrical engineer of the World's Fair, has resigned. Ten years ago he was chief electrician for the Portland Railway Company.

Robert B. Taylor was for 30 years "a scrupulously honest and very pious" employe of the Central National Bank of New York. He lately forged checks against the institution to the amount of \$6500, and hiked out. He was captured in St. Louis.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The regular summer forest fires are now raging in British Columbia, doing immense damage to standing timber.

Point Gravina, one of the most prosperous Indian towns in Alaska, has been destroyed by fire, which caught from an explosion in a saw mill, loss to the village about \$20,000.

In response to large petitions from taxpayers, Portland's school board will probably allow full pay to all Portland city teachers during the three months summer vacation.

The Dalles is now constructing a \$50,000 water system which will bring city supply direct from Mt. Hood. A cement reservoir is being constructed at the foot of the mountain for a reserve supply.

Fat hogs from Wheeler county, are being hauled 60 and 80 miles overland to reach the railroad to be shipped to market. In the past week about 50 head have died from heat, on the trip from the interior to the railroad.

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HOTEL PENDLETON

MANAGEMENT CHANGES TODAY OR TOMORROW.

Successor to the Van Dran Brothers is a Hotel Man of Experience and Comes From Bozeman, Mont.—New Management Will Introduce Some New Methods—Casper Van Dran Will Go South for His Health.

The Hotel Pendleton will change hands either this afternoon or tomorrow. Van Dran Brothers are to retire from the management in favor of J. J. Kelly, of Bozeman, Mont.

While the formal transfer of the hotel property has not yet taken place, the deal is to all intents and purposes consummated. An invoice of the hostelry was taken yesterday and the terms of the transfer agreed on. A large amount of stock is now on hand.

Mr. Kelly came to Pendleton with the intention of investigating the proposition about 10 days ago. He was accompanied by his wife, and the two have thoroughly familiarized themselves with the details of the local business. The new proprietor of the hotel is a man of experience in his line and comes highly recommended. He was in the business at Great Falls, Mont., prior to going to Bozeman, and has conducted hotels in a number of cities of the East and Middle West.

Van Dran Brothers have conducted the hotel for several years, and under their capable management it has grown to be a popular institution. The Pendleton has always paid well and the sale is due to other than financial reasons. Casper Van Dran has been in failing health for some time, and at the earnest entreaty of his wife consented to sell out and go to the coast. His immediate destination will be Seattle. His brother, George is said to have laid no definite plans for the future as yet.

A number of changes and innovations are said to be planned by the new proprietor. It is understood that there are to be no changes in the hotel as regards the present attaches of the hostelry.

Allentown, Pa., July 12.—With Christian Endeavor banners flying to the breeze an army of enthusiastic young people has captured Allentown and will remain in possession for three days. Herman, speaking for the local committee; response to the addresses of welcome by Rev. Edwin H. Romig of Lancaster; annual address of the president and reports of the other officers. The session will be concluded with quiet meditation and prayer, conducted by Rev. William Powlek, of Allentown.
