Peddler's License Invalid. Judge Stocker today rendered a decision in the case of the state of Washington vs. George T. Bacon, who was arrested upon the charge of peddling without license. The court finds the peddler's act of 1903, under which Bacon was tried, to be unconstitutional, because it is not a valid exercise of police power, but a discriminating trade regulation. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Barnhart served notice of appeal to the superior court and a bond of \$300 was fixed.—Spokane Press.

Work on Alpine Mill. Dick Addoms, superintendent of the Alpine, returned this afternoon to the property. The Alpine people have started work on the erection of their 20-stamp mill and expect to have it finished at an early date. The material and machinery are all on the ground and the work is to be pushed.—Sumpter Miner.

New Mining Plant. Construction work has not yet commenced on the Belcher mill, but it is understood that the same will be inaugurated soon. Hauling the big mill plant to the property is possible now, as roads between Whitney and the mine are in excellent condition.—Sumpter Reporter.
