WHY BRYAN WILL CAST HIS VOTE FOR PARKER AND DAVIS

William J. Bryan has given out the following statement:

"I shall vote for Parker and Davis, the nominees of the democratic convention, and shall do so for the following reasons:

First—Because the democratic ticket stands for opposition to imperialism, while the republican ticket stands for an imperialistic policy. On this question, which was the paramount issue in 1900 and which remains an important issue as long as an attempt is made to hold colonies under the American flag. On this issue the convention was unanimous, the platform emphatic, and I have no doubt that the candidate will carry out the platform.

Second—Mr. Roosevelt is injecting the race issue into American politics and this issue, if it becomes national, will make it impossible to consider questions that demand solution. The election of the democratic ticket will put a quietus on this subject.

Third—Mr. Roosevelt stands for the support of war. His friends present him as a man of blood and iron. He believes in strenuousness and inculcates a love for warlike things. The democratic ticket stands for peace, for reason and for arbitration rather than for force, conquest and bluster.

Fourth—The democratic platform declares in favor of the reduction of the standing army and as this plank was unanimously adopted there is reason to believe that a democratic statement on this subject would bring some advantage to the people.

No Reform in Economic Questions.

For these reasons I feel justified in supporting the ticket. A democratic victory will mean very little, if any, progress on economic questions, so long as the party is under the counsel of the Wall street element.

Parker and the Financiers.

On the money question Mr. Parker is as thoroughly committed to the side of the financiers as Mr. Roosevelt. If he does not go as far as the republicans would in retiring silver dollars, in establishing branch banks, in enlarging upon the powers of the national banks and in the substitution of an asset currency for the present currency it will be because he is restrained by the democrats in the house and senate. Nothing greater can be expected from him on the money question.

Trusts and Labor.

On the trust question the democratic platform is very much better than the republican platform, but the nomination of Parker virtually nullifies the anti-trust plank. Unless in his letter of acceptance he commits himself to anti-trust legislation we need not expect him to pursue a different course from that pursued by President Roosevelt.

So far as labor questions are concerned we must await Judge Parker's letter before we shall know whether the laboring man has anything to expect from his election. The labor plank as prepared by Judge Parker's friends on the sub-committee was a straddling, meaningless plank. In the full committee, planks were adopted in favor of arbitration and the eight-hour day and against government by injunction, also a plank on the Colorado situation. If Judge Parker is silent or ambiguous on these subjects

ANOTHER BEEF COMBINE.

Big Packing Houses Plan Further Consolidation of Interests.

All the packers of Denver, to say nothing of the stockgrowers of Colorado, were interested in the Post's exclusive story of the big packing house combine to handle the meat trade of the West, planned by Armour, Swift, Cudahy and other big Chicago firms, says the Denver Post of Thursday.

Predictions that such a combination would be eventually made were immediately recalled, and the probable extent of time it would take to effect the combine was speculated upon.

The packers upon whose plants options have been secured by the big men of the trade declined to make statements and some denied the report, which was nevertheless generally credited.

The local Armour firms made a

move yesterday which shows that retrenchment is in order. Armour & Co., the Chicago packing branch of the big house, gave up its establishment on Market street and moved to the supply depot of the Armour Packing Co. of Kansas City, near the depot.

Contrary rumors were circulated around the stock yards that instead of the Western combination buying the plants of the Western and Colorado Packing and Provision companies, Henry Gebhardt, president of the latter company, was negotiating for a combination of the two plants to control the greater portion of the Rocky mountain trade. The people interested declined to discuss either move.

Valparaiso, Chile, is flooded by water from the interior. Ten thousand harbor laborers have been forced to quit work, and most other affairs are at a standstill.

Charges Adroit Manipulation.

The New York platform was vague and meaningless, and purposely so, because advocates of Judge Parker were trying to secure votes from among the people who would have opposed his views had they known them. If he had sent his telegram to the Albany convention he would have had very few instructed delegates from the South and no possible chance for the nomination. But he and his managers adroitly and purposely concealed his position until the delegates had been corralled. Then his friends attempted to secure a gold plank, which was overwhelmingly defeated in the committee.

After the party had rejoiced over the harmony secured by the omission of the question, and after he had secured the nomination, he injected his views upon the subject at a time when he could not be taken from the ticket, without great demoralization.

Democrats Must Bow to It.

The nomination was secured, therefore, by crooked and indefensible methods, but the democrat who loves his country has made his decisions upon conditions as he finds them, not upon conditions as he would like to have them.

Bryan Not Yet Downed.

After having stated that I shall support the ticket, and after having given my reasons for so doing, I think it due to the democrats of the nation to say that, while the fight on economic questions is postponed, it is not abandoned. As soon as the election is over I shall, with the help of those who believe as I do, undertake to organize before the campaign of 1908, the object being to marshal the friends of popular government within the democratic party to the support of a radical and progressive policy to make the democratic party an efficient means in the hands of the people for securing relief from the element that controls the republican party and for the time being is in control of the democratic party. This plan of organization will be elaborated soon. It is only mentioned at this time that the readers of the Commonwealth may know that the contest for economic and political effort will begin again as soon as the election is achieved.

THE STATE'S FINANCES.

Semi-Annual Balance is \$300,000 Less Than Last Year.

Salem, July 14.—The semi-annual financial statement of State Treasurer Moore shows a balance of \$971,381.73 in the treasury.

This is \$200,000 less than was in the treasury at this time last year, the decrease being due to the large amount of loans made from the common school fund.

That fund is \$500,000 less than it was a year ago. The general fund is \$200,000 greater, the increase being due to the heavier tax levy for appropriations which have not yet been expended, such as the portage railway and Lewis and Clark appropriations.

The general fund receipts for the first six months of this year are \$520,000 as against \$496,000 a year ago. This increase comes in taxes paid by counties under the state tax law.

General fund disbursements are \$437,000 as against \$480,000 a year ago, the slight increase being due to heavier appropriations. Receipts to the common school fund have dropped from \$440,000 to \$297,000, the decrease being due to the fact that fewer borrowers from the school fund are repaying their loans.

Disbursements from the school fund for the first half of the year grew from \$446,000 in 1903 to \$673,000 in 1904, showing the heavier demand for loans from the fund.

These items represent practically all the differences in the financial condition of the state, as shown by a comparison of the first six months of 1904 with the first six months of 1903.
