THE STATE'S FINANCES

Semi-Annual Balance is \$300,000 Less Than Last Year,

Salem, July 14.—The semi-annual

financial statement of State Treasurer Moore shows a balance of \$971,381.-73 in the treasury. This is \$300,000 less than was in

treasury at this time last year. the decrease being due to the large amount of loans made from the common school fund.

That fund is \$500,000 less than it was a year ago. The general fund is \$200,000 greater, the increase being due to the heavier tax levy for appropriations which have not yet been expended, such as the portage rail-way and Lewis and Clark appropria-

The general fund receipts for the first six months of this year are \$820,-000 as against \$496,000 a year ago. This increase comes in taxes paid by counties under the state tax law.

General fund disbursements are \$437,000 as against \$480,000 a year ago, the slight increase being due to heavier appropriations. Receipts to the common school fund have drop-ped from \$440,000 to \$297,000, the decrease being due to the fact that fewer borrowers from the school fund are repaying their loans.

These items represent practically all the differences in the financial condition of the state, as shown by a comparison of the first six months of 1903. Teutsch's.
