GENERAL NEWS.

At Concord, N. H., July 17, will be dedicated a Christian Science church which cost \$200,000.

Nearly all the asbestos in the world is mined in Canada. Last year's output was valued at \$916,000.

General Diaz is 74 years of age and has been president of Mexico for 27 years. He is aging rapidly.

Gerard Reller, supreme secretary of the Catholic Knights of America, is dead at St. Louis, aged 53 years.

It is expected that Portugal will soon give an order to American shipbuilders for the construction of a battleship and a torpedo boat.

The World's Fair commission on July 15 paid to the government the first installment due—\$500,000—and paid it one day in advance.

McIntyre & Marshall, New York brokers, announce that they are authorized to put up \$10,000 against \$5000 that Roosevelt will be elected.

The big freight sheds at the Duluth dock burned, setting fire to two tugs, which were also destroyed. The loss is great, but undetermined as yet.

The Canadian parliament has defeated a bill providing for a graduated system of railroad fares beginning with two cents and ranging upwards.

A handcar upon which rode four young people—two gentlemen and two ladies—was run down by a freight train near Emporia, Kan. John Owens was killed and the remaining three were fatally injured.

At Great Falls, Mont., on July 14, 426,000 pounds of wool brought from 16 1/2 to 19 1/2 cents, to Eastern buyers.

The First National Bank of Winlock, Wash., has closed its doors through the rascality and dishonesty of the president. It is alleged.

Frank Wannager, of Dayton, Mont., shot and killed Martin Johnson, in a family row, Friday, and is now being pursued by a posse in the hills.

Seattle labor unions threaten to impeach the city officials in the ordinance providing for an eight-hour day on municipal works is not enforced.

All the union ice men are on strike in Seattle, but so far it is ineffectual, as the city is being supplied with non-union ice carried by non-union men.
