It is estimated that about three miles of jetty, or one and a miles more than will be built this fall, will deflect the sand from the

bar into deep water, and change the entire current of the Columbia, at the point of delivery into the ocean, so as to entirely remove the bar, give 40 feet of water over the present obstruction, and permit free passage of

all deep water vessels. After this has been accomplished, and the mouth of the river is opened to large vessels, then the deepening to the river from Portland to Astoria, will be the next step in the develop ment of the transportation facilities mail.

The sum originally estimated for the ship canal at The Dalles is \$4,-000,000, which will be forthcoming as soon as the right of way is secured for the government and the progress of the work on the canal demands the money, congress having given this assurance to the war department.
