BIG WHEAT YIELD

ALL OREGON CROP RETURNS BEAT EXPECTATIONS.

Grain Harvest in Willamette Interrupted by Wet Weather—Correspondents From All Over the State Say Crop Returns Are Surprising—Early Peaches and Apples on the Market—Some Smut in Sherman County.

Nearly a half of an inch of rain fell in the Willamette valley during the latter part of the week, and greater amounts are reported in the coast counties. Frequent rains also occurred in the eastern sections of the state. The rains west of the Cascades have done an immense amount of good.

They will help all growing crops especially potatoes, corn, oats and late spring wheat. Hops also will be benefited, as well as gardens and pasturage. The grain harvest has been interrupted by the wet weather, and in the coast counties and plateau section some cut hay will be more or less damaged, but these losses are insignificant compared with the great good rains have done.

A sharp frost occurred Wednesday morning in portions of the Willamette valley and in some of the coast counties, but the damage was confined to tender vegetation and it was not serious, notwithstanding the lateness of the season.

Fall wheat is filling nicely, the heads being large and the berry plump. Although very little wheat has yet been threshed, correspondents generally report the yields to be better than expected. In Sherman county some complaint of smut is made, but generally the quality of the wheat is reported above the average.

Hops are doing nicely, but it is not expected that the yields will be quite so heavy as last year, on account of the long spell of dry weather.

Stock continues in excellent condition, but pasturage is getting short, as is usual at this season of the year, and the milk supply in the dairy herds has decreased slightly during the week.

Peaches are ripe and plentiful, but apples have dropped badly during the week, although the prospects still continue favorable for a good crop of apples.

Columbia River Valley.

Hood River, Wasco county, P. D. Heinrichs—The second crop of alfalfa will be light, except where irrigated in time; first crop of hay heavy; it is mostly stacked and some has been baled; potatoes and vegetable gardens doing well where water is plentiful; grain cut and shocked; quality good; rain is not wanted; it would do more harm than good.

Wasco, Sherman county, W. C. Morehouse—Fall and winter sown wheat ripening and filling well; a general rain occurred Friday night, which will be of great benefit to late sown spring grain; weather cool; fall and winter barley being cut.

Ione, Morrow county, P. G. Balsiger—Occasional rains during week beneficial to spring grain; volunteer and fall grain ready for harvesting; some grain is burned from hot winds, but the average is well filled, second hay crop on creeks flooded some from high water the fore part of the week.
Bialock, Gilliam county, W. J. Mariner—May and June being very dry, the rains of July were too late to benefit fall sown and volunteer wheat to any great degree; spring wheat stood the dry spell remarkably well, and the July favorable weather promises to fill out a good berry and result in a good average yield; fall sown is heading out well but the berry is not so plump as is the volunteer wheat; harvesting is now in progress.

Plateau Region.

Summerville, Union county, C. T. Colt—Thunder showers prevailed intermittently throughout the fore part of week; heavy rain from Thursday on; much hay cut and farmers await clearing weather; spring grain will be greatly benefited; fruit where not killed by frost is doing nicely; gardens good.

Rock Creek, Baker county, J. K. Fisher—Week rainy and haying is backward; hay already cut is damaged, so there is very little stacked; the

Ashwood, Crook county, James Wood—Haying is mostly done; first part of week heavy thunder showers, which turned into a steady rain, and is of benefit to the second crop of alfalfa; fruit crop heavy; gardens good; grass fine on range; stock of all kinds in fine condition.

POLISH CONVENTION CANCELED.

Russian Authorities Said to Have Forbidden Meeting of Scientists.

Vienna, July 20.—The tenth congress of Polish physicians and scientists, which has several hundred members in America, did not open in Lemberg today as scheduled and announcement is made that the congress has been indefinitely postponed.

The fact that many Polish physicians who are leading members of the congress are now with the Russian forces in the Far East is given as the cause for the abandonment of the meeting this year.

According to well founded rumor, however, the holding of the congress was forbidden by the Russian government because of the fear that it might engage in political discussion or in criticism of the Russian policy in the warfare with the Japanese.

For Fairbanks' Seat.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 20.—Much interest is manifested by the politicians in the republican primary in Marion county today to select candidates for the legislature. The county convention meets tomorrow. The primary is the first lap in the race for the seats in the United States senate to be vacated next winter by Senator Beveridge and Senator Fairbanks, the latter, of course, depending upon the election of Senator Fairbanks as vice-president. An active canvass is under way in the interest of Governor Durbin, and Congressmen Hemenway and Landis, the three active candidates for the senate. There is talk of Harry New, the national committeeman from Indiana, entering the race, in which event the contest would be even more interesting and exciting.

South Dakota Democrats.

Aberdeen, S. D., July 20.—The democratic state convention to nominate a full state ticket is in session here today. The defeat of the Hearst element in the national convention at St. Louis caused considerable confusion if not demoralization in the ranks of the party in South Dakota, where the followers of the New York editor were in the ascendancy. As a consequence considerable uncertainty prevails as to the action of the state convention, and nothing is definitely decided upon as to the candidates. Andrew E. Lee is prominently mentioned for the gubernatorial nomination.

Furniture Makers Meet.

New York, July 20.—Several thousand furniture makers and buyers are here for the annual convention of the Furniture Association of America, which began today. The meeting, which lasts two days, is being held in connection with the furniture exposition now in progress. Important measures affecting the trade, will be discussed by the convention. Among the questions will be that of preparing for protection against labor unions, and it is hinted that the manufacturers may decide in favor of the open shop. Insurance rates is another matter that will receive attention, it being held by the furniture men that the existing terms are exorbitant.

Alabama Baptists.

Anniston, Ala., July 20.—Baptist workers from all parts of the state are gathered in Anniston for the annual state convention of their denomination, which was formally opened today and will continue until the end of the week. The morning session was occupied largely with the reports of the state board of missions, the board of ministerial education, Howard College, Judson Institute and the Baptist academies of the state, all of which showed that the year has been one of more than ordinary activity in the various branches of church work and that the results attained have been of a gratifying nature.

North Dakota Prohibitionists.

Fargo, N. D., July 20.—The prohibitionists of North Dakota are holding their state convention in Fargo today with a good representation from all parts of the state. The convention will endorse the platform and nominations of the Indianapolis convention and name candidates for members of congress and for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state and the other state officers to be voted for in November.

North Dakota Republicans.

Grand Forks, N. D., July 20.—The republican state convention assembled here today and was called to order by Chairman Hanna of the state committee. The convention will place in nomination a full state ticket, including a candidate for governor, to be voted for at the coming state election.

ELKS IN PARADE

GRANDEST PAGEANT EVER SEEN IN OHIO.

Fully 15,000 Members of the Order in Line, Besides Thousands of Citizens—New York Lodge No. 1 Held the Post of Honor in the Line—City and State Officials Review the Procession.

Cincinnati, O., July 20.—The parade today of the Elks who are in national reunion here, proved to be one of the biggest demonstrations of its kind ever seen in Cincinnati. It is estimated that fully 15,000 members of the order were in line, the various delegations representing lodges in every state of the Union.

The prizes offered for the best appearance and for the most unique costumes resulted in a varied and attractive display, many of the delegations appearing in dress typical of the part of the country from which they came.

New York lodge No. 1, the pioneer lodge of the order, had the place of honor in the line. Grand Esquire James of San Francisco, acted as grand marshal of the parade. The route led through Race street, Court street and other leading thoroughfares, all of which were elaborately decorated in honor of the occasion.

Thousands of spectators lined the route and loudly cheered the paraders. Mayor Fleischmann and a party of distinguished guests, including city and state officials, reviewed the parade from a stand in Government Square.

Eagles' State Convention.

Reading, Pa., July 20.—The city is in gala attire today in honor of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, whose annual state convention is in session. The convention is the largest ever held by the order in this state, large delegations being present from Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, Shamokin, Allentown and other chief cities of the state. The business sessions, which will last through tomorrow and Friday, will be liberally interspersed with features of entertainment arranged by the local lodge of the order.
