Where to Stop at North Beach

The Breakers Hotel is conducted to attract the best patronage, and is a summer hotel that is unsurpassed on the Pacific Coast north of the famous California beach resorts.

The building has an ocean front of 100 feet, is 76 feet wide and four stories high, or 73 feet from the ground floor to the top of the observatory.

It has handsomely furnished rooms, single or en suite, for 250 guests, each room being carpeted.

The house is lighted by electricity with electric lights and electric call bells in every room, and these lights make it one of the most brilliant beacons on the entire coast.

The entire lower floor is thrown open to the public, and, being beautifully carpeted, the spacious reception room and large, airy halls always form favorite gathering places for guests. The billiard and pool room is also quite popular for merry gatherings.

An Aeolian and Pianola in the commodious parlor furnishes delightful music at all times, and musicals are pleasant features during the entire season.

The Breakers has a regular orchestra which furnishes music for informal dances and balls, and the large dining room, with its smooth, hard floor, makes an ideal hall for regular dancing parties.

An abundance of fresh and salt water fish, clams, oysters, crabs and other sea food is always on our menu; our entire supply of milk, butter and cream comes from our own herd of Jersey cows, and poultry and eggs are supplied from the hotel farm adjoining the grounds.

There are hot and cold, fresh and salt water baths in the house, with private baths and toilets.

The waves of the ocean at high tide roll within 200 feet of the hotel, and the beach in front is superb for surf bathing.

On the grounds are bowling alleys, golf links, tennis courts and croquet sets; on the lake, just back of the hotel, is a fleet of sail and row boats, and on Shoalwater bay, just east of the lakes, is a gasoline launch for parties of fishermen, picnickers or others who prefer the warm, still-water bathing to the tumbling of the surf.

All trains stop at the railroad station in the hotel grounds, and no crowding into hotel omnibuses or walking in sand is necessary, since the hotel ground is a perfect velvety lawn, where the guests are practically landed at the hotel door.

The Breakers Hotel is located at Breakers Station, a regular ticket office, where all trains stop. It is one and a half miles north of Long Beach Station.

HE ADMIRES BRYAN TRAILMAKER MINTO

OREGONIAN TELLS OF HIS IMPRESSIONS OF ST. LOUIS.

Says W. J. Bryan Could Command the Attention of the Delegates When Every Other Speaker Failed—Great Demonstration Was When Cockerell Was Nominated for President by Bryan.

Thomas R. Sheridan of Roseburg, one of Oregon's delegation to the national democratic convention at St. Louis, is in the city today, on route home, says the Oregon Daily Journal. Mr. Sheridan is well pleased with the work and results of the convention, he having been a Parker man from the first.

He, with Governor Chamberlain, C. E. Redfield and Frederick V. Holman voted for Parker from the first ballot to the last, while with like firmness his colleagues in the delegation, S. M. Garland and J. D. Matlock, stood for Hearst. James Gleason voted for McClellan, and W. F. Butcher for Bird S. Coler.

"My strongest impressions of the convention? Well, perhaps the thing that struck me most forcibly was the influence of Mr. Bryan. His personality carried far more weight than that of any other man. No one else could quiet the convention. When ever he appeared on the platform and signed with his hands for quiet, the noise immediately ceased.

"I think he acquitted himself with credit, and the statement from certain quarters that he hurt himself in any way by his actions in the convention is a mistake. He yielded all that he should, and he did it gracefully. I think Bryan went out of the convention just as strong as he went into it.

"Another feature that impressed me was the strength and high character of the men from the South. There were some splendid delegations from the southern states. I met many of these men and formed acquaintances that have greatly increased my respect and admiration for the southern people.

"As to the result of the convention, I am sure it means harmony. There was a harmonizing spirit throughout, and it was strong to the last. The best man was nominated and every one went away feeling well pleased with the work of the convention.

"The greatest demonstration in the entire convention occurred when Mr. Bryan nominated Francis M. Cockerell of Missouri for president. It was not so much a demonstration by delegates as it was by the spectators, of whom there were thousands in the hall. It was a monster convention, and intensely interesting all the time, even through the whole night when the convention sat through the contest on resolutions and nominations.

Mr. Sheridan talked interestingly of the various notable personages at the big convention. He said Champ Clark was a very strong presiding officer. John Sharp Williams, for the first time prominent in a democratic national convention, is not a strong man physically. While he is a man of ability, his personality is not extraordinary. Hill attracted but little attention on the floor. Sheehan of New York, was noticeable for his sociable manners.

OREGON PIONEER SEEKS HIGHWAY OVER THE CASCADES.

John Minto, Aged 83, Now Leading an Excursion of Young Men to Find a Better Pass Between Eastern and Western Oregon—Summer School of Forestry Included in the Project.

Hon. John Minto of Salem, one of the most experienced pioneers living in the state, and who, for 60 years, has been tireless in promoting Oregon interests and in helping to develop the resources of the Willamette valley, is planning to go into the Cascade mountains in a few days, where he will instruct a class of young men in forestry and, incidentally, in the work of building a trail from the end of the railroad through Minto Pass to Crook county, says the Albany Herald.

This is one of Mr. Minto's hobbies, and a good one it is. He believes that the trade of Central Eastern Oregon could and should be brought across the mountains to the Willamette valley, and that this can best be done through the pass that bears his name.

For years he has been advocating the construction of a trail—many years ago he helped cut one through the forest of the Cascade range at the same place—and he will now spy out the land once more, and see if the trail, which he hopes to see grow into a well traveled road, cannot be cut this year and, though over 83 years old, this active pioneer will undertake the labor and hardships of a summer's stay in the mountains to bring about his cherished project, and see it become a fact.

Mr. Minto will be accompanied by quite a party on his trip to the mountains, and he will be supported in his work by Manager Edwin Stone, of the C. & E. railroad, who is very much impressed with the old pioneer's plan, and thinks it will result in the opening of a valuable highway of traffic.

The summer school of forestry, as advocated by Mr. Minto, and which he proposes to conduct, is another of that gentleman's pet theories, and he will give a party of young men practical instruction in forestry in the natural timber of the Cascade range.

His long experience in Oregon, and especially in the mountains and forests of the western part of the state, make him an excellent instructor in that line, and he will inculcate valuable lessons, and will sow a seed that will be of vast benefit to the future of the state.

SOUTH DAKOTA IS LAUNCHED.

Will Have Two Pre-Eminent Qualities—Speed and Concentration—Total Displacement of 14,000, With Heavy and Effective Armament—Speed of 23 Knots Will Be Attained.

San Francisco, Cal., July 20.—Arrangements have been completed at the Union Iron Works for the launching tomorrow of the cruiser South Dakota, which is to be one of the finest and most formidable fighting machines of the new navy. In order to get the best advantage of the tides the launching will not take place until about half past six in the evening.

The South Dakota is a fine representative of the class of magnificent armored cruisers of which another of the same type is the Colorado, which recently established a new speed record.

These two ships, with the Maryland, California, Pennsylvania and West Virginia, all of them of the same class, dimensions and armament, have been likened to battleships possessing a protection of armor only a little under the weight of that designed for the huge ships of the Georgia class, while they are greatly superior to all battleships in point of speed.

The South Dakota will have an unusually powerful battery, made up of a great number of 8 and 6-inch guns. She will have a total displacement of 14,000 tons, and will be exceeded in size by only four vessels now building, these being battleships of 15,000 tons.

The South Dakota will derive pre-eminence from two qualities—speed and concentration of fire. Her wonderful engines, driving twin screws, will develop a horse power of 23,000, capable of propelling the ship at a speed of 23 knots an hour—perhaps even faster.

This speed will at once take her outside the reach of pursuing battleships, while her powerful battery will make of her a dangerous antagonist, both in engagements with vessels of her own class and those carrying heavier ordnance.
