DEEPEN NEW YORK HARBOR.

Launching of Big Steamer Baltic Discloses Startling Condition.

New York, July 21.—The recent de-parture of the gigantic new liner Baltic on its first return trip demon-strated an interesting feature. The

steamer was compelled to start out with a light load, about five or six thousand tons less than its capacity, to be able to get out of the harbor.

With a full load the Baltic draws about 36 feet of water, from four to five more than the depth of the water at the bar. Even at 32 feet it is a risky thing for the enormous steamship to cross the bar.
