## GIVING AWAY HOMES

ROSEBUD RESERVATION LAND DRAWING.

Government is Giving Away 2400 Splendid Farms—Applicants for Homes Will Reach 150,000—Must Register and Draw Lots—Registration Will Close July 23—Drawing Commences on July 28.

Bonesteel, S. D., July 23.—The Rosebud reservation, including about 416,000 acres of the richest land in the Northwest, is to be given away by Uncle Sam in homesteads of 160 acres each during this month. This means that 2400 splendid farms are to be had practically free.

The land will be distributed by lot, for about 150,000 people will apply for homesteads. In the old times there was a rush and the revolver or rifle played a part. There will be a rush again, but only the 2400 lucky ones will take part. These are the conditions:

Registration of those desiring homesteads will commence July 5 and will continue to and including July 23. Registration booths will be open at Chamberlain, Bonesteel, Yankton and Fairfax.

Drawing for the right of entry will commence July 28 at the district United States land office at Chamberlain and continue until the names of all persons registered have been drawn. Each person will be notified by postal card at the address given by him or her at time of registration, of the drawing of his or her name, and of the time he or she must present his or her application to make entry.

The drawing will be under the supervision of the secretary of the interior, and under the personal direction of Commissioner Richards of the general land office and a committee of disinterested persons appointed by him. Every safeguard to insure fairness will be adopted. It is not essential that persons who are registered shall be present at the drawing unless they wish. No one will gain or lose anything by the time, place or order of his or her registration.

Persons whose names are drawn thereby secure the right to make selection of the lands, and homestead entry therefor, in the order of drawing, beginning with No. 1.

Within six months after making entry the successful applicant for a farm of 160 acres must establish a residence on the land selected by him or her.

No fee whatever is required at the time of registration. Each person may procure and execute necessary papers for registration, for which notaries will be permitted to make a charge of 25 cents.

Those who become entitled by the drawing to make entry must, at the time of filing their homestead applications, pay the land office fees, which amount to \$14 for 150 acres, and in addition the sum of \$1 per acre for the amount of land embraced in the application and the cost of preparing filing papers.

### ABUNDANCE OF WATER.

Pendleton Will Not Have a Shortage This Year—All Streams Are Full.

Water Superintendent Brown avers that there is not the slightest indication that there will be a shortage of water in this place this year. The wells at the intake have more than an average supply in them, while there is much more water in the river now than is usual at this season. On the first of last August there was no water in the river at all opposite the Lee street bridge; now there is considerable flow. The mountain streams also have more water in them than is usual at this season, according to all the campers and fishermen.

### Yaquina Bay Oysters.

Yaquina Bay oyster beds are said to be flourishing at a marvelous rate. It is believed that a million dollars' worth of the bivalves can be produced there yearly. There are also prospects for beginning the industry at Coos Bay. The oysters were planted in Yaquina bay last spring. A former trial resulted in a failure owing to the immaturity of the bivalves planted. "The last experiment with eastern oysters is a success," said State Fish Warden Van Dusen of Astoria, who has just returned from Coos bay. —Jacksonville Democrat-Times.

## BIG COLLEGE MEET

INTERNATIONAL FIELD MEET AT LONDON.

Harvard and Yale Teams Go to England to Compete for Honors With Oxford, Cambridge and Other Universities—Big Odds in Favor of American Team—Great Enthusiasm Over the Event.

London, July 23.—At the Queen's Club grounds this afternoon 18 fine athletes, the pride of Yale and Harvard, meet an equal number of representatives of the universities of Oxford and Cambridge. It is the only international collegiate field meet of the season in England and to say that the public is deeply interested in the result is putting it mildly. If anything were needed to intensify this interest it is found in the fact that this is the third time that the representatives of these four universities have met and that this meeting is in the nature of a "rubber," both Britons and Americans having one victory to their credit.

There are nine events on the program, six of which are to be decided on the cinder path and three in the field. While the public on this side naturally expects the Britons to win the meet, it is conceded that the Americans will give them a hard tussle. Many of those who have seen the Americans in training since their arrival here are frank enough to admit that they would not be surprised to see the Yale and Harvard boys return across the Atlantic with the British scalps dangling at their belts.

In the sprinting, the weight throwing and the jumps Yale and Harvard are expected to make their best showing. In the distance running the Englishmen are expected to win away off. The middle distance runs are debatable and they are expected to furnish the greatest excitement of the match. With Schiek of Harvard, and Torrey of Yale, in the 100-yard dash, it is felt that this event is just as good as within the grasp of the Americans.

There is little to choose between them and both are in excellent form and condition. With Shevlin and Glass, Yale's giant football players, the Americans also expect to win the hammer throw. The Britons are willing to concede this event as it is believed that no one in Oxford or Cambridge can hurl the sphere within 10 feet of their record throws.

With H. W. Gregson of Cambridge, probably the best distance runner in England, the Britons seem to have a trifle the greater prospect of success. A close analysis leads to the conclusion that the meet will be the closest of its kind ever held between American and British athletes, and certainly neither team has what the Americans call a "cinch" on the victory.
