### GENERAL NEWS.

An iron miners' strike was ordered at Birmingham, Ala., Tuesday, affecting 6000 men. The difficulty arose over wages and hours.

The pope has refused to grant the demands of France and relinstate the two French bishops. It would be a surrender of papal rights.

S. J. Small, of Seattle, was elected president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union, which has just closed its annual session at St. Paul.

Manager Ben Jenkins of the Cafe Luzon, in the Philippine reservation at St. Louis fair, was fatally stabbed by a Filipino, Tuesday. A riot took place in his cafe.

The battleship Ohio was given a preliminary run in San Francisco Bay Tuesday and everything proved to be all right. She will be given her official tryout at Santa Barbara, on Thursday.

John R. Blamey, for 18 years treasurer of the eastern division of the American Wireworkers' Union, has absconded from Holyoke, Mass., with \$10,000 of the order's sick benefit fund.

The Russian royal family, all the available nurses, and all the court physicians are now gathered at Peterhof, awaiting the birth of the czar's heir, which is scheduled for any day after July 27.

Admiral Dewey and crew have just been awarded \$1,657,365 prize money for capturing the Don Juan de Austria, and other Spanish vessels in Manila Bay, on May 1, 1898. This is but half the total value of the prizes, the other half going to the credit of the navy department.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

Two small boys whose names are not given, fought a duel to death with knives, above Whitebird, Idaho, Tuesday.

Lars K. Nelson and George Lampkin, two Great Northern fishermen, were drowned in the Missouri river at Great Falls, Tuesday, a sail boat capsizing with them.

Miss Anita Thurston, a school teacher of Eugene, was caught by the ebb tide at the beach near Sampson, at the mouth of the Lower Umpqua, Tuesday and drowned.

Work has been recommenced on the bridge across Snake river near Weiser. It will be 800 feet long and will cost \$35,000. It is being built by the two counties on either side of the river, with some state aid.

Robert Sherman, a man in the employ of the Pacific States Telephone Company, was overcome by heat while working at the top of a high pole, Tuesday, at Baker City, fell to the ground and was killed.

Captain Carl Ackerman, a skipper in the employ of the George D. Grey Steamship Company, of San Francisco, committed suicide Tuesday by taking laudanum. He had gambled away \$600 entrusted to him, with which to pay the crew on arrival in port, and chose death rather than the disgrace.

W. H. H. Samson, and Earl McAdam, of Oregon City, took a herd of cattle into the mountains, Tuesday, and camped in a deserted cabin at night. In starting the fire in the morning, the smoke refused to go up the chimney, and on investigation they found a full-grown cougar crouched in the offset in the chimney. They did not wait to cook breakfast.

## SANITARY BUILDINGS

PENDLETON SCHOOLS WILL BE AMONG BEST IN THE STATE.

Dr. C. J. Smith Declares That Plans for New Structures Are Drawn Along Healthful Lines — State Health Laws Are to Be Revised.

That Pendleton will have among the best, if not the best public schools in the state, is the opinion of Dr. C. J. Smith, one of the leading physicians of Eastern Oregon, and a member of the state senate. "The plans submitted for the new buildings," he said, "should meet with the hearty approval of all patrons. The heating, ventilation and plumbing are all of the very latest approved methods, and the sanitary condition of the structures will be nearly perfect."

Senator Smith has in contemplation the revision of the state health laws at the next session of the legislature. "There are a number of minor details," he remarked, "that should be remedied. As an instance I will mention the remuneration of the county health officers. There is no provision for this pay as the law stands. As the office is now conducted it is almost impossible to have the county officer work with the state board. Just what will be done in the way of a new health law, is not definitely known. So far no draft has been made."

Flock to Relic of St. Anne. New York, July 27.—Men, women and children, lame and halt, crippled and deformed by disease or accident, went in thousands today to pray before and kiss the relic of St. Anne which rests on the altar in the crypt of the Church of St. John the Baptist, in East Seventy-sixth street. It was the end of the nine days' pilgrimage to what has become known as the Lourdes of America, because of the healing power said to reside in the relic.
