### GENERAL NEWS.

Fire destroyed the largest wire cable factory in St. Petersburg, Wednesday, loss about \$1,250,000. It also contained a large quantity of war material.

Immense quantities of gold and silver have just been discovered in an abandoned old mine near Shawanunk mountains, close to Otsville, N. Y.

The army transport Dix, which left San Francisco Wednesday for Manila, carried 246 head of heavy work and cavalry horses for the army in the Philippines.

The push cart peddlers of New York have been barred from the streets by the commissioner of streets and police department. Hereafter they will be confined to regular market quarters.

Owing to the continual hindrance to business caused by the oppression of the beef trust of its abused employees, Fort Scott, Kan., feeders will build a \$100,000 independent mutual packing plant.

John J. Ryan, the prominent race-horse owner of Brighton Beach, was arrested Wednesday for manipulating a get-rich-quick scheme, in which innocent victims have been beaten out of \$300,000.

Troops surprised a band of 52 Bulgarian brigands, Wednesday, setting fire to the granaries in the country near Salonica. The troops attacked the brigands and out two of the marauders escaped alive.

The Finnish money unit, the marka, has been removed from circulation as such, and its value changed to the basis of the ruble. The marka is equal to 19 1/2 cents American money, or exactly equal to the franc, while the ruble is valued at 49 cents American.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

The school population of Multnomah, has increased 1865 in the past year.

The lumber shipments from Portland for the month of July will reach 10,000,000 feet.

Hope Clayton, a woman of the town at Astoria, committed suicide, Wednesday, through disgust for the life she was leading.

The first two carloads of new Walla Walla wheat reached Portland on Wednesday, four days earlier than the first shipment of new wheat in 1903.

Felix O'Neill, a pioneer Montana ranchman, arranged for his funeral, Tuesday, at Butte, and then went to his ranch, seven miles out of town and blew his brains out with a pistol.

Over 100 applicants for timber claims were in line at the Vancouver land office Wednesday, on the occasion of the opening of parts of two townships in Pacific county, Washington.

William Udell, aged 19, found guilty of living illegally with Dolly Wells, aged 14, at Tac Dalles, was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary, Wednesday, and the girl was consigned to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society at Portland.

Edward Boyer, of Gervais, has sued B. A. Nathman, a prominent merchant of that place, for \$5000 damages, for injuries received in an attack upon him last spring, by a dozen men, among whom was Nathman, who attempted to drive Boyer out of town.

## IN MUTTON MARKET

FLOCKMASTERS ARE BOTH  
HOPEFUL AND CONFIDENT.

The Rising Market Caused by a World-Wide Scarcity of Sheep, Australia and South America Being the Heaviest Losers—California is No Longer a Competitor of Oregon, But is a Consumer of Outside Mutton and Wool.

The sheepmen seem both hopeful and confident as regards the prospects for the summer and fall market for sheep on the hoof. They note not only that prices have appreciated of late, but that the general tendency is upward. The recent advance from \$1.50 to \$2 for yearlings, and for other classes in proportion excuses their optimism, while the explanation is found in the almost universal shortage of sheep in the greater mutton centers in other parts of the world, followed of course, by a comparative scarcity that is reflected in the bulled markets of the world.

In South America great floods have depleted the sheep flocks to such an extent that the sheepmen, stunned by their disasters, do not even attempt to estimate their losses.

In Australia it is believed that 100,000,000 sheep have died as the direct result of drought during the past three years. One Australian alone lost four-fifths of his sheep, which numbered 1,250,000 when the droughts set in three years ago this fall. The mutton flockmasters of Australia are in some districts importing hay at \$50 a ton to keep their blooded rams and high-grade breeding ewes alive. Some have been known to buy immense quantities of black-strap molasses and the coarse sugar product that is its by-product, and by stewing them upon brush and coarse feed otherwise unpalatable, induce their sheep to eat enough to keep alive while waiting for the rains.

The Umatilla sheep raisers also call attention to the fact that California has become a consumer of outside mutton and wool instead of being a competitor of Oregon and the Northwest in general.

As many sheep of all grades have been sold this year as ever before in any one year up to this date in the season, and considerably more than last year, also. The prospect for still heavier later sales is improving every day, as the buyers' agents remain on the ground and inquiries from buyers in the East who have no agents in the field are more insistent than ever before.

### PRaises UMATILLA.

Tom Richardson Enjoys the Rich Country Adjacent to Pendleton and Speaks Highly of Its Prospects.

Tom Richardson, manager of the Portland Commercial Club, who addressed the citizens of Pendleton, Monday night, praises the country he saw near Pendleton, on this, his first visit to this section.

In speaking of his trip, the Morning Oregonian of yesterday says:

While in Pendleton, Mr. Richardson was the guest of the Commercial Club and was taken for a drive on Monday over the fields in the vicinity of Pendleton, where he was shown the wheat both standing in the field and in the process of being harvested. On the road to Pendleton the irrigated lands were pointed out to Mr. Richardson, and he was shown much land lying along the track which is soon to be put under water, either by private enterprise or by the government.

Mr. Richardson is very much impressed with the prospects of Umatilla county. "It is a great country," he said, in speaking of his visit, "and the opportunities for development are boundless."

"When the land around Echo is put under water, as it is now partially, it will make the most productive part of the state. The soil will grow anything and the climate is all that could be desired, making it a paradise that only waits the touch of water to make it bloom and spring to the front."

"Umatilla county, with its wheat, stock, wool and all the varied things that can be grown on irrigated ground has a future before it second to no county in the Northwest."

### A SHEEP COUNTRY.

Umatilla Rambouillet Discount the Best Imported Animals.

Charles Cunningham has ordered 100 full-blood Rambouillet rams which will arrive about August 15. These animals will weigh an average of 200 pounds each, and nothing finer of their breeding exists in the United States, and in Mr. Cunningham's opinion, of no other breeding.

A pet theory of Mr. Cunningham's is being vindicated as follows: That the climate of Umatilla county has a peculiar adaptation to the development of the Rambouillet that does not exist in the same degree even in that province of France where the Rambouillet originated and has been bred to perfection for hundreds of years. The evidence in the case is as follows:

Mr. Cunningham owns thoroughbreds of this breed that not merely grade A1 on all the points noted in sheep exhibits, but actually weigh 50 pounds more than the best full-bloods from which Mr. Cunningham's sheep sprang. He owns many Rambouillets that weigh 250 pounds each as against 200 pounds for the best imported thoroughbreds.

### BAKED APPLES.

The Way to Make a Convenient and Delicious Dessert.

The difference between apple sauce stewed quickly over the fire and that baked slowly for several hours in a moderate oven is so great that one could easily believe that different fruits had been used. Each method, if carefully followed, produces a delicious result, and, while some persons have a strong preference for one or the other, to my mind it is difficult to decide which is the better way. Therefore it is well to use both methods, cooking the first apples that come in midsummer by stewing, and later, when the cool days of early autumn make a fire less objectionable, trying the baking.

The dish for baking is as important as that for beans baked properly and also for Indian puddings, and should be the same in style and material. Cut the fruit (and you may use in this way any kind of apples or pears which are too green or hard to use uncooked) into quarters; then remove the cores and skins. Allow one cup of sugar and one-half cup of water to two quarts of fruit. The amount will vary with different apples, and it is important not to use too much sugar, for the long cooking seems to develop the natural sweetness of the fruit. Cover them closely and cook in a slow oven four or five hours or until they have a deep rich red color. If they cook too fast, the steam will cause them to burst and run over the edge and result in a mushy sauce, but a moderate heat, long continued, will leave each quarter distinct in the clear syrup. Let it cool in the pan and turn it out without any stirring of the fruit. This may be poured at once into sterilized jars and sealed the same as canned fruit, if you are not likely to use it all soon. As a sauce for a breakfast or dinner it is acceptable; with cream and hot biscuit for supper it is delicious, and as a filling for pastry shells it is convenient.—Home Science Magazine.
