Combine at Work,

On the farm recently purchased from Mr. Rigby a stop was made to watch a Rigby-Clove combine working. Arthur Rigby was in the con-ning tower and the 16 mules seemed to move along without any great amount of effort.

Mr. Clove, who was watching the work of the combine, said that the field would probably go nearly 40 bushels to the acre, as it is a very choice piece of wheat land.

Not far distant from this field could e seen a combine with 26 horses in W. H. H. Scott's grain. At our next stopping place we found A. M. Jack. He has 130 acres of leased land that has a splendid crop. About 10 acres had been threshed.

"If it keeps up all over the field as it has for this 10 acres, it will run over 4 Obushels to the acre," said Mr. Jack.

The Harvest Scene.

To a person who has never watch-ed a wheat crop being gathered the process is a very interesting one. Two headers circle round the field heading the wheat. Each of mese headers are attended by four wagons which drive along beside the header and receive the headed grain. The header wagon is driven beside the platform of the threshing machine, a hook is attached to the net and in 30 seconds the wagon is empty, a horse being the motive power that empties the nets.

the load from the wagons. "We move four times in a quarter section, 40 acres being as large a territory as it pays to work at one set-ting. Moving is a short operation. The elevator is on wheels. The engine pulls the threshing machine. The cook wagons, water tanks and other paraphernalia are readily moved and the spouts are pouring out their steady stream of wheat again before you

"We have got it down to a system like moving a circus. The only loss to the farmer is the straw. But they usually pasture the stubblefield till spring and then burn the stubble and plow it under.

If it could be plowed under, of course, it would be better for land, as it would return to the land the straw, but it is hard to work the straw under.


