Farmers' Warehouse Succeeds. C. A. Price, manager for the Farmers' Warehouse Company at Elberton, Wash., has bought the Clarke & Eaton warehouse for his company for the consideration of \$700. The company's business has increased to such an extent that it needs more room. Last season the company shipped over 150,000 bushels of wheat and 50,000 bushels of oats and barley. The company is made up of all farmers in the vicinity of Elberton. The main object of the company is to handle their own crop, and by so doing they have been realizing more for their grain, and the company has every year declared a liberal dividend to its stockholders.

New Willamette Wheat. The first new wheat to be reported in the valley was delivered at Albany on Friday evening. The millmen say that it is of a good quality and the yield was above the expectation of the grower. Oregon never has a crop failure and when the croakers are busy declaiming the country, the excellent soil and climate get in their work, and the result is bounteous productions of all kinds.—Salem Journal.

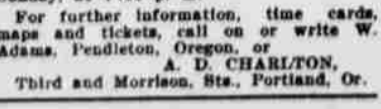
