PREPARING FOR THE CAMPAIGN

REPUBLICAN HEADQUARTERS FOR CHICAGO.

Cortelyou Will Work Principally in New York. But Western States Will Be Managed From Chicago—Lowden, the Millionaire Son-in-Law of Pullman, Will Lend His Assistance to the Merry War.

Chicago, July 30.—Managers of the republican national campaign, including Chairman Cortelyou and Secretary Dover of the national committee, are rounding up in Chicago preparatory to the opening of the campaign headquarters, which is scheduled for Monday next.

Although Chairman Cortelyou will spend the greater portion of his time at the New York headquarters, to be near the president, it is evident that the campaign will be conducted largely from Chicago, as in former years.

Eight years ago, when the main headquarters were located in this city, the work required two floors on the Wabash avenue side of the Auditorium building, and a large store-room across the street.

Four years ago Chairman Hanna and his staff occupied the third and fourth floors of the Michigan avenue addition to the Annex, while the storehouse and shipping department took up a business house in Wabash avenue.

For the present campaign it has been found that more space will be required than in 1896 or in 1900. A large part of the parlor floor of the Annex has been secured. The ship-

ping department will have the same location as four years ago.

Preparation are being made to send out great quantities of campaign literature. The speech delivered by Elihu Root as chairman of the convention will be the first document to be placed in the hands of voters. It has been printed in pamphlet form and is now ready for distribution.

It is understood that Frank O. Lowden, the national committeeman from Illinois, Graeme Stewart, and Charles G. Dawes will be connected with the headquarters work here as members of the advisory committee. Harry S. New of Indiana, will probably have general charge.

Particular attention will be given to Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin. The distribution of literature will begin at once, but the speaking campaign will be deferred until the first week of September.

BRIGHTEST STUDENTS.

Eastern Oregon Furnishes Highest Standard of Scholarship.

J. B. Horner, registrar of the Corvallis Agricultural college, left this afternoon after spending several days in Sumpter in the interest of the institution, says the Sumpter Miner.

Mr. Horner says that Eastern Oregon is very poorly represented in the school. Last year out of an attendance of over 500, less than 100 came from Eastern Oregon, and only four from Baker county. And Eastern Oregon, too, is paying a big per cent of the state tax which goes toward the support of the school.

The institution has all the departments usually found in a first-class college or university with few exceptions, besides departments in manual training, agriculture, domestic science, business and the like.

There is also a thoroughly equipped mining department. Mr. Horner thinks that one thing which keeps Eastern Oregon students away is the railroad fare since the school is in the eastern west end of the state. He is trying to perfect an arrangement with the railroad companies for a reduction of fare for students.

The Eastern Oregon students, Mr. Horner says, are the brightest in the school. They are usually a little behind when they enter, but soon take the lead. He attributes their quickness of mind and general aptness to the mountain climate and surroundings to which they have been accustomed.
