Nez Perce Consolidation.
Articles of incorporation have been signed for the Nez Perce Water & Power Company at Nez Perce, of \$100,000, divided into 100 shares of the par value of \$1000 each.
The corporation has purchased the Nez Perce electric light plant, the creamery plant, the flour mill and the Lolo power plant and in addition will take over the water works system of this place. The water plant will be installed immediately and the owners have secured the springs on the Indian lands, five miles southwest of the town, which will be the source of supply for the plant. The springs could not be purchased outright, but were leased from the Indians for a long term of years with the approval of the department at Washington.
