## G. A. R. MEETING

GRAND ENCAMPMENT TO BE HELD AT BOSTON.

Historic Old City Making Great Preparations to Entertain the Veterans—Largest Crowd of Visitors in History of the City is Expected—Sessions Will Last for Three Days.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 5.—The local committee on arrangements expresses confidence that the coming national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic in Boston will be one of the most significant, most interesting and most largely attended reunions ever held by the veterans of the civil war. It has been many years since the veterans were entertained as the guests of this city, but the reception then given the members of the Grand Army was one of the most notable experiences in the story of the order. It is the apparent purpose of the people of Boston and vicinity to make this encampment still more noteworthy. The expert testimony of passenger agents whose roads reach Boston directly or indirectly is that the crowd will surpass any ever seen here since the great Knights Templar conclave in 1895.

### Historic Old Boston.

Boston is especially attractive to most of the members of the Grand Army on account of its historic associations and the prominent part it took in the events leading up to the conflict between the states. There is no city in the country in which the G. A. R. and similar organizations flourish more than they do in Boston. The various Grand Army posts of the city, and of the entire state in fact, together with the local organizations of the W. R. C., Ladies of the G. A. R., and Sons of Veterans have entered enthusiastically into the work of preparing for the reception and entertainment of the visitors for the coming encampment. If the welfare and comfort of every stranger here on that occasion are not amply provided for it certainly will not be the fault of the local committees.

### Sessions Last Three Days.

The sessions of the reunion will last for three days, beginning on Tuesday, the 16th. The entertainment of the veterans and their friends, however, will cover the entire week. Probably the most interesting features of the entertainment program will be carried out on Thursday when the veterans will be taken on an automobile ride to the places of historic interest about Boston. Leaving the city early in the afternoon they will go out through Cambridge, Arlington, Lexington and Concord, the territory made famous by the patriots of the revolution, and along the British line of retreat which followed those early victories of the American arms. The termination of the route will be at Concord, returning by way of Sudbury and Newton.

### Grand Parade.

The same evening there will be given the parade of illuminated floats, which promises to be one of the most brilliant features ever arranged for the entertainment of the Grand Army veterans. The parade will pass over the surface railroads of the city and will consist of 16 tableau cars. There are to be nearly 10,000 electric lights in the make-up of the floats. The keynote of the entire display will be patriotism. The first tableau will be the "Birth of the Flag," in which the Goddess of Liberty appears. The second float will represent the purchase of Louisiana in 1803. Other floats will be "Ocean Conquered in the Year 1819," "The Land of Flowers," depicting the state of Florida; "Triumph of Statesmanship," "Triumph of Electricity," "Lane Star," "Eldorado," "The Triumph of Diplomacy," "The Reunion," "The Midnight Sun," "Triumph of Engineering," "Triumph of Finance," "The Pearl of the Pacific," and the final float "Our New Possessions."

Another novel feature of the entertainment program will be a fish dinner to be given on Friday of reunion week. The dinner will be served at Bass Point, and on the trip the visitors will have an opportunity of seeing Nahant and neighboring places.

During the week Boston's historic buildings, including the Old North church, Faneuil hall, King's chapel and the Bunker Hill monument will be open to the general public.

### GOLD NUGGETS.

The Process in Nature by Which They Are Formed.

That gold is formed from solution is generally recognized. The miner receives the theory because it explains the making of gold to him, but he often wonders how it is done, so here is what has been seen: Daintie once prepared a solution of gold and left in it a small piece of metallic gold. Accidentally a small piece of wood fell into the solution. The solution decomposed, the gold assumed a metallic state and collected and held to the small piece of undissolved gold, which increased in size. Another investigator heard of this and made a dilute gold solution, in which he immersed a piece of iron pyrites and left it there a month. He added also organic matter, and at the month's end the pyrites were covered with a film of metallic gold. Pyrites and galena were next tried, and each was covered with gold. Gold, copper pyrites, arsenical pyrites, galena and wolfram were also tried, with similar results. Metallic precipitates were tried, and while they threw down the gold as a metallic powder they did not cause it to cohere nor to plate any of the substances tried. Organic matter thus seemed the necessary chemical agent. Through the wood used in these experiments gold was disseminated in fine particles. Imagine these experiments conducted by nature through ages and the result could be a nugget.—Mines and Minerals.
